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Preliminary Grade School Plans Reviewed

Preliminary plans for the new elementary school to be put under construction in Section 14, northeast of Spring Lake and I-19, were reviewed by the Farmington Board of Education Monday night.

Following a general plan used on some other schools in the district, the Board found it necessary to make only a few minor changes. Approval was given contingent on studies by the special teachers' building sub-committee and the building sub-committee of the school site advisory committee.

Work will be started on final drawings and specifications as soon as studies are completed by the two building sub-committees.

A basic 12 classroom, two kindergarten unit is called for, but an alternate bid will also be given for a 18 classroom, two kindergarten structure.

If enough saving can be realized by building the larger unit, the school will be ready a year and then making a six classroom addition, this action may be called for, it was indicated.

Cites Relationship of Traffic Violations and Delinquency

There is a comparable relationship between the problems of youth delinquency and traffic violations in the opinion of Dr. James E. Brennan, professor in police administration at Michigan State University and a former New York policeman.

The traffic violation problem is a broader and more complex form of social delinquency, unrestricted as to age group and largely condoned by society, Dr. Brennan maintains. Records indicate that 8 out of 10 fatal traffic accidents involve a traffic law violation as a major contributing cause. Last year, with almost 100,000 accidents recorded in Michigan, more than a million convictions for traffic law violations were reported to the Secretary of State's office. The extent of the form of social delinquency is not only fantastic, the cost is appalling with a loss of 4,461 lives and an estimated economic loss in excess of \$200 million for 1959. These statistics make the youth delinquency problem look small by comparison, said Dr. Brennan, yet society is largely apathetic about it.

"If a child steals from a store," he points out, "we make a case of it; we put him under supervision; to rehabilitate him; bring to bear our social forces."

"But if a youth with an automobile violates the law we fine him a few dollars and let him go."

"In effect, we tell him a license to go out and do it again."

Dr. Brennan is that rare combination of an experienced policeman, who walked a beat over 30 years ago, and a scholar of criminology with a Ph. D. degree. A specialist in youth problems, Dr. Brennan is on the faculty of the M.S.U. school of police administration and public safety.

burst of applause from the floor.

He suggested that the presentation of the petition was done in a manner to try to influence those in attendance. Nelson also pointed out that one of the large land owners had earlier charged that the proposed zoning imposed by his group was a form of exclusion similar to what is being done in Greece. Nelson noted that the land owner group included Grosse Pointe and Detroit real estate men who specialize in selling large plots of land to developers commented on the zoning meeting of the school board.

It is something that should be respected as almost everyone in the room had depended on the residents' reaction with the statement with such comments as, "you're thinking of the township you were in yesterday," coming from the floor. Nelson then withdrew the reference to FHA.

He then expressed the opinion that the ultimate population of approximately 125,000 established by the planning consultants will never materialize because much of the land zoned residential will never be developed as it will be used for institutions, golf courses etc..

Sheldon continued stating one acre yields just two lots of 15,000 square feet after development which he felt is acceptable to the majority of prospective home buyers.

NELSON THEN made the suggestion that developers and residents contribute to school taxes rather than building huge subdivisions taking profits and then leaving the residents holding the bag.

Ken Fuoss related that he had bought a new home four years ago in north Farmington and was assured by the builder that the sewer would be useful for at least 20 years but it is already inadequate, he said.

Rodney Lockwood, builder and developer, probably got the roughest treatment of anyone who took the floor. Lockwood was to compare the tax situation in Bloomfield Hills, where he lives, with Farmington Township.

He was asked if he owned land in Farmington township. When he replied that he neither owned land nor lived here, he was asked what his business was at the hearing. He replied that he was interested as a resident of Oakland County.

By this time it was 11 p.m. and Herman Schmitt called a recess in the hearing.

WHEN the hearing is completed, the zoning ordinance and text will be reviewed by the board at home and will then be submitted with recommendations to the Oakland County Coordinating Zoning and Planning Committee.

Upon completion of its study the Committee will turn over the proposed zoning changes to the Township Board with recommendations and the Township Board will be ready to take action.

other matter relative to this same proposed development was W. E. Ryan of the Township Planning Board. Re-location of the school site to run through the subdivision is called for with a 60 foot of an 80 foot wide roadway. Ryan asked the School Board whether it had any objection to this and Board members informed him that they did not.

The other area discussed was a school site in Section 15, north of 11 Mile and west of Power Road. Construction of over 165 new homes on either side of the new 114 Mile Expressway is planned in this area. Thompson-Brown had agreed to sell the school district a site here some time ago but the transaction was delayed until it was officially decided what the exact route of the new expressway would be.

The Board agreed to the location of the property that the developers proposed to sell to the district and asked that a letter be sent instructing them to proceed in getting the necessary legal papers drawn up.

Need for additional land at the Wooddale elementary school site in Kendallwood 1 subdivision was also discussed but no action taken. It was agreed to negotiate with the owners of two different adjacent parcels for approximately two more acres. This is presently an eight acre site.

Seek Change in X-ray Planning

A letter from the Property Owners Association of Section 16 and 17 was read at Tuesday's meeting of the township Board requesting help from the township in having plans called for an elevated bridge over Drake Road on the proposed expressway changed.

It was pointed out in the letter that the State Highway Commission had originally planned a depressed area but revised the original plan calling for a depressed area with a raised section, which would eliminate the noise created by the elevated bridge over the area around the expressway.

After some discussion by Board members a resolution was passed to have Supervisor Hill write a letter to the Highway Commission, urging supporting the complaint of the citizens and requesting that the plan be returned to its original form, pointing out that this is the only planned grade in the entire expressway.

Negotiate \$65,000 Loan at C'ville

The Clarencville Board of Education will borrow \$65,000 within the next two weeks from the Manufacture's National Bank against \$73,000 in school funds anticipated from the state sometime in July.

The bank submitted the low interest rate of 2.40 percent and the loan will be repaid prior to September 1, 1960. The loan was necessary because state aid was due some time ago but has been delinquent.

Shop Locally First

To Borrow for School Needs

A resolution was passed at the Farmington Board of Education at its regular meeting Monday night authorizing a borrowing of \$600,000 in anticipation of state aid due the district in the coming school year. The district is ending the current school year in a little better financial condition than it was in a year ago, Supt. G. Harrison told members of the Board. But, there were not enough balance on hand to meet obligations during June and August until a state payment comes in, he commented. Nor will there be enough on hand or from state checks to meet all obligations during the first part of the borrowing school year until local payments start coming in, he added.

The state use to make a payment to school districts until recent years. The unstable state financial picture for the last couple of years has reversed this practice, however, he said.

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
