

City Engineer Papke Resigns

A letter of resignation was submitted to the City of Farmington this week by Frank Papke, city engineer. He has accepted a position with the Sallie Engineering Company in Detroit and will start work with that organization in the very near future.

Papke expressed regrets in his letter of resignation but stated that he did not feel that he could afford to pass up the opportunity for a substantial pay increase and opportunities for advancement with the private company.

"I will be glad to continue to serve the city in an advisory capacity until a replacement is found for me," Papke commented.

PAPKE ASSUMED duties as city engineer in April of last year. A registered engineer with a degree from the University of Detroit, immediately prior to coming here he had been employed with a private engineering consulting firm in Detroit for 24 years. He was also employed for 11 years with the Wayne County Road Commission; seven of these as a field engineer and four in the engineering design department.

Married and the father of three children, Papke resides at 2333 Marbledale in Bel-Aire subdivision. He has stated that he will continue to make his home here.

When objections were voiced by residents in the vicinity, however, the matter was brought before the Zoning Board of Appeals even though such pools are permitted in these areas as residential. Wanting a thorough study of the matter before taking action, the board referred the matter to the Township Planning Board.

Sand Removal, Grading OK 8 More Months

Leveling and sand removal operations presently in progress on a ten acre parcel of land on the west side of Halsted Road, short distance north of 13 Mile will be allowed to continue for a short period of time.

The decision reached by the Township Zoning Board of Appeals at its regular meeting last week was to allow the operations to be continued by Riley-Fisher until February 28, 1961.

THIS APPROVAL was granted subject to compliance with several requirements, however. Among these was a stipulation that the parties owning the land file a statement with the township stating that this is a bonded grading operation designed to put the property in shape for subdividing. They will also be required to comply with all provisions of the township's open pit and mining ordinance with the exception that fencing will not be required if it is determined to be unnecessary for safety.

Frequent calcium-chloride treatments on roads which trucks hauling will be using will also be required.

It was further stipulated that the land would have to be completely leveled off to grade by the Feb. 28 date and seeding done. A topographic map showing the levels of the land on the ten acre parcel at the time operations are concluded will also be expected by the township.

In addition to placing assessments on all new homes constructed in the city in the future, Keating will begin a program of depreciating assessments on present homes on a city-wide basis.

Special County Election Set For August 2

In addition to nominating candidates for state and county offices at the August 2 General Primary Election voters will be asked to ballot on a special county proposition.

The proposition calls for the creation of a sinking fund for Oakland County to provide for the construction and repair of public buildings. Electors will be asked to approve a special county tax levy of 1/4 of 1 mill for a period of four years—1960 to 1963, both inclusive—in order to do this.

THIS WILL be a two part proposition. Electors will not only have to approve the additional tax levy called for but also authorize an increase in the tax limitation as set by state law in the amount necessary to accomplish this.

The special election was called for in a resolution adopted by the County Board of Supervisors on June 7.

Work on a new court house and county building is now underway. Plans were to do what could be done now with present funds available and do the remainder of the work in stages as monies become available.

It has now been determined that work must move ahead more rapidly if the problem of getting adequate housing for various county offices is to be met fast enough. The need for more county office space sooner has been attributed to the rapid population buildup which has taken place in recent years.

County population increases are expected at an even faster rate in the years ahead than in years recently past.

The new main, built by the Detroit Department of Water Supply at a cost of 2 1/2 million dollars, runs along Eight Mile from Evergreen to Farmington Road, a distance of seven miles.

The main means immediate supplies of Detroit water for Livonia and Redford Township while it opens the way for water in the city of Farmington and some areas of Farmington Township. Water will flow into Farmington as soon as local distribution systems are completed.

Livonia has recently completed construction on a one mile section of 30 inch and a two mile section of 36 inch main along Farmington Road at a cost of approximately \$450,000 to connect its distribution with the new Eight Mile line.

THE EIGHT MILE line is part of the Detroit Water Department's Metropolitan area development program and is one of three constructed this year.

Representing the City of Farmington at the main opening ceremonies were Mayor Robert B. Lindberg and City Manager Earl Scherffus. Township Supervisor Curt Hall and Clerk Floyd Cairns attended in behalf of the Township.

The city is expected to have Detroit water sometime this summer while the southern portion of the Township should have it by early next year. It is expected that water, through a proposed Inkster Road Main, will be available to the northern portion of the Township in 1962.

Change Council Dates For Meeting in July

Due to the fact that the next regularly scheduled City Council meeting falls on the Fourth of July, the meeting date has been changed to Monday, July 11.

The second meeting in July will also be held on week later, on Monday, July 25.

Owners in Southwest Section of City Have Drainage Problems

Complaints and general discussion on drainage problems occupied a major portion of the City Council's time at its regular meeting Monday night.

All of the complaints came from residents living in the Alta Loma subdivisions and Hutton Gardens subdivision, both in the southwest section of the city.

Robert Bryar of 33725 State Street told the Council that when Cass Street was built up the natural drainage of water in the vicinity of his home was blocked. Even when there is only moderate rain, pools of water five inches or more in depth collect in his back yard.

Bryar claimed, He attributed the problem to the fact that the catch basin put in at the rear of his property was too high up but proper grading to permit water to flow to it had not been done.

John Gibbens stated in a letter to the Council that during the heavy rains last Thursday water from the sanitary sewer backed up into his basement. He indicated that this was the first time that he had trouble with water in the basement in the six to seven years he had lived here and asked for an explanation of the difficulty.

GIBBENS LIVES on Liberty Street in the southwest section. A complaint about the height of catch basins on the street in the vicinity of his home was also voiced by Russell White of 33775 State.

Clyde Herlich of 23132 Cass stated that he was acting as spokesman for residents belonging to the Alta Loma Homeowners Association and that they wanted to know if it was soon as possible with the general drainage problem in all three Alta Loma subdivisions and Hutton Gardens.

During a general discussion Councilman Randy Brotherton stated that his basement and those of some of his neighbors in Bel-Aire subdivision had water in them during last Thursday's heavy rain but that it was not standing very deep. Councilman V. O. Bates also stated that some of the water in his neighborhood had water in them but not to any serious depths.

COUNCILMAN Brotherton mentioned whether something could be done to prohibit the flow of excess water from the area north of Bel-Aire subdivision into the city's sewer system. He said he had promised although indications were given by City Engineer Francis Papke that it did not appear too likely.

A suggestion was made by Mayor Robert Lindberg that early consideration be given to the obtaining of some engineering cost estimates to have a survey made of the drainage throughout the city.

In answer to this proposal, City Manager Earl Scherffus said that the city's legislative was passed on recently which might prove helpful in getting a project of this kind completed at a minimum of cost. Necessary legislative action has been taken whereby it will now be possible to obtain Federal funds for projects of this kind on a 50-50 matching fund basis, he commented.

The Council instructed the city administrator to follow on this and to see a drainage survey can be started with Federal aid help in the near future.

City residents should register at the City Hall at 53322 Grand River and township residents at the Town Hall at 27115 Farmington Road. Persons may register anytime during regular office hours Monday through Friday with the City or Township.

On the final day of registration, July 5, hours for registering will be from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m.

Burns Require Hospitalization

Kenneth Kingsley, 33315 Shiloh, was rushed to the County Hospital last Friday after receiving second and third degree burns on 36 percent of his body in a gas station fire.

Kingsley was burning a pile of old tires near the Farmington Pure Oil Station when his clothing caught fire. He rolled out of the burning tires and was successful in putting the fire out.

Hospital officials report that it is satisfactory condition and will probably remain there a while.

May Vacate Greenbelt In Bel-Aire; Hearing Set

The greenbelt behind the Bel-Aire Hills Shopping Center and residential property immediately to the west may soon become a thing of the past as the result of action taken by the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

A motion was passed by the council calling for elimination of the 15-foot greenbelt and, Monday, July 11, at 7:30 p.m. a public hearing on the proposed action to vacate the entire greenbelt with that half abutting residential property along the highway and the other half to the owners of the shopping center property.

Plans have now been completed by the Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce to dedicate the new tennis courts and picnic facilities they have provided in the City Park for the City of Farmington this Saturday.
