Petitions for Con-Con Filing Deadline June 30

The petition deadline for getting petitions in calling for placing the Constitutional Convention Amendment on the November ballot is Thursday, June 30. A recent count indicated that 150,000 names have been obtained with the goal set at 300,000. This figure was set as a safe margin for the 237,000 names required.

Petition solicitors in the Farmington area are urged to mail in the petitions by June 30, properly notarized. Those requiring assistance in the processing of petitions may contact E. El Tyler, 23069 Violet for assistance. It is important that the petitions reach the Headquarters of Citizens for Michigan before the deadline date, Tyler commented. The petition drive is sponsored by Citizens for Michigan, in cooperation with the Jaycees, The League of Women Voters, Parent and Teachers Association, American Association of University Women, Detroit Bar Association, Detroit Educational Association, Michigan Educational Association, Detroit Building Trades Council, The Michigan Council of Churches, and other organizations.

The Farmington Chapter of CFM has completed the first study phase of state government structure under the direction of R. W. Lahti of the government department, of Oak Park High School.

The chapter resolution for Con-Con is the first step necessary for obtaining improved state government. The study found that the present condition is critical, Tyler said.
