H'way Mileage Over 900 Mark

Michigan's network of divided four-lane highways will pass the 900-mile mark on July 1 when a 20-mile section of Interstate 94 freeway opens to traffic from Albion to Battle Creek.

The new section of highway built at a cost of approximately \$10.3 million, will give Michigan the second longest continuous section of Interstate freeway in the nation — 94 miles from Jackson to Paw Paw.

The mileage of divided four-lane highway in Michigan, including both limited access freeways and four-lane divided routes without access control, has nearly doubled during the last three years.

Michigan had 419 miles of all types of divided four-lane highway three years ago and will have 912 miles when the Albion-Battle Creek section is opened to traffic.

Of the 912 miles, 387 are built to all Interstate standards adequate for 495 traffic. The amount of freeway — highways built without full control of access — has more than doubled during the last three years from 101 miles on July 1, 1957, to 387 miles on July 1, 1960.

The Albion-Battle Creek section of Interstate 94 replaces one of the worst stretches of old US-12. More than 50 percent of the old route is marked with yellow paint for no-passing zones.
