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Principals to Attend June 27 Policy Meeting

James Geiger, principal at Farmington High School, Harold Humble, assistant principal and Jerry Spink, principal at Farmington Junior High School, three Farmington educators, will attend a "Cheating Match" sponsored by the Michigan Association of Secondary School Principals (MASSP) at Higgins Lake, June 27-28.

A department of the Michigan Education Association, the MASSP has a membership of more than 100 principals throughout the state.

Keynote speaker at the meeting will be Eugene S. Thomas, principal, Central High School, Kalamazoo, and a member of the executive committee of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, a department of the National Education Association.

Major topics for discussion will include administrative policies, extracurricular activities, guidance, testing, personnel services, and many other problems concerning the operation of schools.

School Curriculum Attracts Attention

When September 8 heralds the beginning of the 1960-61 school year, returning FHS students will be greeted by a number of changes in the school, such as a 150 increase in Farmington Senior High enrollment, a larger teaching staff, and certain curricular changes.

An addition of about 150 more students, increasing the school's population to 1150, will necessitate such measures as the incorporation of the present and future students into class rooms and increasing the faculty to a maximum of 55 members.

A change in the school's curriculum involves making some geometry into a two semester one credit course which will be a substitute for the present plane geometry class. The administration has also planned:

change in the science department that will allow students of exceptional ability to elect chemistry in their sophomore year. Changes in the art department will involve the separation of the Art III and IV classes, an increase of three classes over last year's number, and the addition of another art teacher.

Report Measles Trend Down

LANSING.—Measles, on the rampage in various sections of Michigan since the first of the year, appears to be abating, according to Dr. F. S. Leeder, director of the Division of Disease Control, of the Michigan Department of Health.

But, infectious hepatitis, which should be falling off with the approach of summer, does not show any sign of doing so and is well on its way to a record high year. The national trend also is above normal.

Hepatitis is a communicable disease capable of causing serious liver damage and sometimes death.

In the week ending June 3, 1,293 new cases of measles were reported, compared to 1,700 the week before, a reduction of 40%.

Chalfant Heads Fund Program

The luncheon was held at the General Assembly of the Church of the Nazarene in session here this week. Alumni from around the world were present.

Principle speaker for the luncheon meeting was the Rev. Hugh C. Bemmer, a 1919 graduate of the Kankakee, Illinois college, and now General Superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene.

Music for the program was provided by the Orpheus Choir, a 48 voice group from the college under the direction of Professor Naomi Larsen, chairman of the Division of Fine Arts and by Professor Gerald Moore, Detroit, Michigan, a 1947 graduate.

During the program, the Alumni president, Mr. Fred Chalfant of Farmington, presented President Harold W. Reed at a token representing more than 1200 Alumni pledges totaling \$100,000 to be applied on the college's three million dollar development program. Approximately 600 alumni attended the luncheon.

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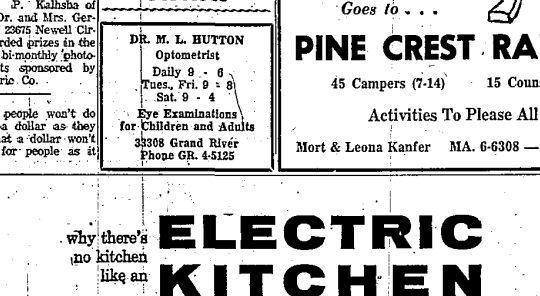

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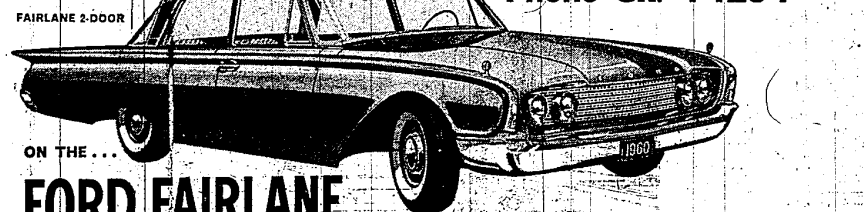
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
