Prof. to Speak On Heredity in Sunday Series

A Wayne State University sociologist's views on "Heredity and Humbuggery" will lead off a series of seven Sunday summer meetings at the Farmington Universalist Church.

Dr. Thomas Hoult, associate professor of sociology at Wayne State, will speak July 10 at 10 a.m. He said he would present the idea that "most beliefs about heredity are sheer humbug."

Dr. Hoult, a resident of Farmington for six years, is author of three books, the most recent entitled "Sociology of Religion." During the coming academic year he will be on sabbatical leave from Wayne State and will intern at Merrill Palmer School in counseling.

THE SUMMER program at the church also will include special programs for young people aged 9-15 and story-telling for children 4-8 during the adult meetings.

Mrs. Warren C. Kellogg, who has had many years of experience with Girl Scouts in the Detroit area, will lead the first young people's session with "Tricks to Use on your Next Camping Trip." The younger children will hear stories from Miss Mary Tozer, special education teacher at the Burns Elementary School in Detroit. A nursery for children under four also will be in session.

Ford Production Highest Since '55

Ford Motor Company produced 197,981 passenger cars and trucks in June to raise its six-month combined output to 1,220,577 units. The six-month total featured production of 345,735 Falcons and Comets in the company's new compact car line. Ford's truck production for the first six months of the year set a new postwar high of 200,784 units, topping the previous January-June record of 194,045 produced in the banner year of 1953.

The company's combined passenger car output of 1,020,100 units for its six months was second only to 1955's postwar record of 1,450,526 units.

GM Production Up Over June 1959

General Motors produced 344,439 passenger cars and trucks in June in the company's history. In the United States and Canada during June, as compared with 338,551 during June, 1959, it was announced today.

Of the total vehicles produced by GM during June, 238,012 were passenger cars and 46,427 were trucks.

Patterson said the 46,556 Dodge cars built in June, 1960, exceeded the previous monthly record, set in August 1959, by 439 automobiles.
