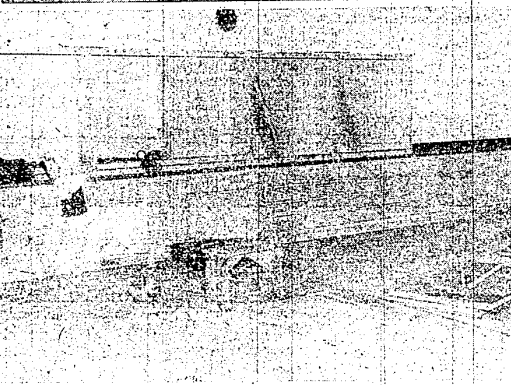
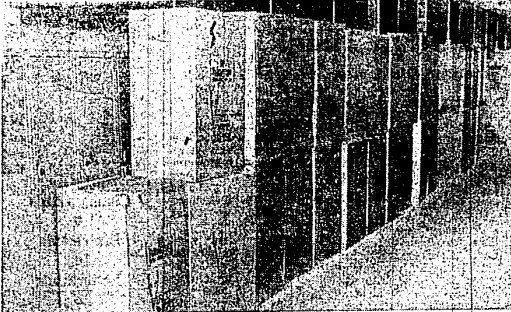

Freezer Food Plans Top List Of Fraud Complaints

Food freezers sold in combination with various types of food schemes cause the largest share of complaints, to the office of the Attorney General in the area of consumer frauds, according to a state official.

Investigation indicates that before signing any contract for the purchase of a food plan, you should consider the following:
1. Representations that a food plan allows you to buy foods at special discounts or wholesale prices are often grossly exaggerated.

You may be induced to pay an exorbitant price for a freezer which is supposed to include food but actually does not. You may pay for a membership card in a food plan which supposedly will save you enough money to pay for your freezer. You may be told that by joining the food plan you can purchase food at wholesale for the rest of your life.

These are gimmicks. The food plan generally will not save you money. It will cost you a freezer and food separately from legitimate merchants.

THE DISCOUNT or wholesale prices are usually the same as you would pay by judicious shopping. The grade of meat and other items to which you are entitled may be misrepresented. The stock from which you may select your groceries may be limited and inadequate. Companies involved have on several occasions discontinued business, leaving food plan members with no place to get

help food and with no one to return their money.

2. The food freezer itself may be grossly overpriced. Always check the price with a reputable local dealer before you sign any contract.

3. Do not sign the contract for the purchase of the freezer and food plan in blank as is too often done. See that all representations made by the salesman are included in the contract.

When the terms of the contract are filled in later by the company or salesman, the terms are often different than represented to you. If you complain to the seller, you may be informed that the salesman is no longer employed by him and you are stuck with the contract. A cold shoulder for a persistent salesman may save your food budget from future bankruptcy.

90 Drown in State So Far

Forty-nine boating and water accidents added 16 deaths and 25 injured persons to the list of water victims in Michigan in a week.

Up through July 26 this year there have been 189 reportable water accidents which have claimed 90 lives and injured 99 persons. Forty-six of the accidents were property damage only.

Included in the 90 fatalities were 21 swimmers or waders, 13 boat operators, 11 boat passengers, 11 who fell into rivers, six children who strayed from parents and into water and 28 who drowned in miscellaneous mishaps.

With water sports activity normally heavy in August, the State Police again emphasize the importance of vigilant safety practices to prevent needless injuries and loss of life and curb the growing toll.

Helps Prevent Heart Attacks

Women have a built-in protection against heart attacks according to Dr. Park Willis III, associate professor of internal medicine at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

This woman's guard is estrogen, the female sex hormone. It prevents the occurrence of arteriosclerosis, or coronary artery hardening, which is often a contributing cause of coronary disturbances. The reason why estrogen acts as a deterrent to heart attacks has not yet been confirmed, Willis says.

Estrogen is developed in the ovaries and is present throughout most of a young woman's life. This protective agent diminishes after the menopause. Women then may begin developing conditions which lead to arterial narrowing, such as the deposition of cholesterol. By comparison, men become susceptible some 20 to 30 years earlier.

There has been some treatment of coronary diseases using estrogens to help prevent attacks. Results seem to be good, according to Dr. Willis.

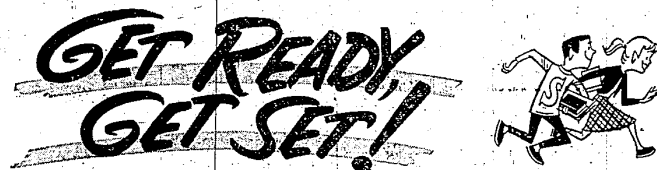
