Don't Overlook White Fish as Summer Game

Hook and Jime anglers are "missing the boat" to summer sport a number of Michigan's northern inland lakes.

That's the word from Conservation Department fisheries men who lake trout angling was one of recent years has turned up large whitefish populations in lakes that were seldom. Before this, they knew little about whitefish numbers in Michigan waters.

Apparently, fishermen have not been tuned in to this opportunity because they give little attention to this fine food fish during the summer months.

Whitefish fever hits its highest pitch among most fishermen during the fall spearing season.

ANGLING FOR whitefish is somewhat of a specialized sport. Successful fishermen know that fishing over baited areas, usually marked with buoys, puts them in a good "bargaining position." At this time of year, bait should be placed in deep waters where whitefish retreat when shallow areas become too warm.

Canned or whole sweet corn, macaroni, rice, tapioca, or oatmeal make excellent baits. About half a pint of bait should be scattered around buoys daily for three or four days before fishing begins. Fishermen are warned against overbaiting these areas which should be about 30 feet in diameter. This generally causes bait to sour. It's best to bait areas twice a day when fish are biting in good numbers, otherwise once a day is enough.
