

Health Insurance Coverage Rises

The number of persons in Michigan with health insurance reached a new high of 6,357,000 at the end of 1959, the Health Insurance Institute reported.

The report was based on the 14th annual Health Insurance Council survey of health insurance coverage in the U.S., which revealed that nearly 128 million Americans, or 72 percent of the total civilian population, were protected by health insurance as of December 31, 1959.

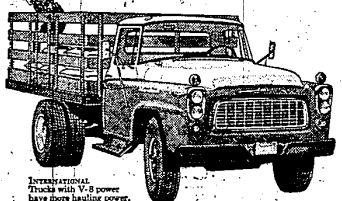
