C'ville Schools To Open Sept. 7

Pupils who attend the Clarenceville public schools will begin the following morning, Thursday, September 8.

Total enrollment in the school district is expected to exceed 2,000 students when the new term starts. This represents an increase of 11 percent over the enrollment figure of last June. A gain of 170 pupils is anticipated in the elementary schools while the senior high school will have 75 more students with an additional 30 expected in the junior high school.

Only those kindergarten pupils not previously enrolled during pre-school registration last May will be required to register on September 7. Notices have already been sent to parents of those children already registered, specifying assignments for morning and afternoon sessions.

The time schedules for the various schools are as follows: Senior High, 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m.; Junior High, 8:55 a.m. to 3:25 p.m.; Elementary Schools, 8:40 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. and kindergarten, morning session, 8:40 to 11:10 and afternoon, 12:00 to 2:30.

suit should be sent back to the lower courts.

AS THE RESULT of the delay in getting the interceptors hooked-in with the Detroit system, the State Health Department has now issued an order that "no more sewer construction permits be issued in the Farmington and Evergreen districts except in those areas which are served by existing treatment plants."

The order came in a letter received by Farmington Township officials the latter part of last week from Donald M. Pierce, chief of the sewage division of the Michigan Department of Health. He stated in the letter that it was felt such action was necessary because of the uncertainty in the timing for the opening of the interceptors.

If court action becomes necessary and connection of the Farmington interceptor is delayed for any extended period, plans for starting on several new subdivisions in the township in the near future will have to be altered. New building activities in the township and to the north in West Bloomfield have already started to show decline because of the sewer hassle, it was indicated.

WEST BLOOMFIELD Township officials have asked the Oakland DPW to negotiate with Detroit to separate the Farmington interceptor from the Evergreen interceptor and permit immediate hookup of the Farmington line. Hook-up of the Farmington interceptor, nothing to do with the drainage problem in Southfield or the Eight Mile drain determined to be needed, West Bloomfield Township Supervisor John Richard has asserted.

West Bloomfield officials have made it clear that they will not be able to meet these payments on the Farmington interceptor due next April because of the delay in getting the interceptor hooked-up. The money to make this payment is coming from building permit tap-in fees, it was explained.

cement in the broken up areas be charged.

The Council decided to go ahead with the blacktopping despite Barber's claim.

Bids were taken for the blacktopping work proposed to be done with the Stulvert Asphalt Co. making the lowest bid, according to the assistant city engineer. The Council authorized a go-ahead on the three blacktop jobs at an estimated total cost of \$1,160.

The city engineer stated that work could be started almost immediately.

Also discussed was proposed repair work on streets in Alta Loma subdivision. It was reported by the assistant city engineer that a cost estimate of \$6,650 had been received on the proposal to apply a double seal coat and pee-gravel to all streets.

Councilmen immediately rejected the project as being too costly. It was agreed, however, to have city crews go back in and do a more careful job of patching.
