Township Board Proceedings

A Regular Meeting of the Farmington Township Board was called to order on September 19, 1960, by the Chairman, at 8:10 P.M. Members present were Hall, Verry, Cairns, Bassette, Hug, Brown and Wilcox. Township Attorney, Joseph T. Brennan, also present.

Minutes of previous meeting held on August 9th, 1960, read by Clerk, and stand approved.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Cairns, that the Agenda be accepted with the exception of Report of Planning Board and Item 13 being moved ahead, and Item 7 being stricken. Carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Wilcox, supported by Cairns, that the Vista Villa Preliminary Plan in Sec. 26 be returned to Developer in accordance with their request. Carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Hug, supported by Cairns, that application for a license to sell beer in the Village Road be approved. Roll Call Vote - 6 Yes, Brown abstaining. Carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Avery, supported by Brown, that Township Attorney Brennan review letter received from the Nelson in re possible ordinance and report thereon. Carried, unanimous.

MOTION by Brown, supported by Cairns, that Matiusk be hearing first meeting in November, and that in the meantime investigate the possibility of a new building for the Township of Farmington. Carried, unanimous.

The City Council hereby ratifies and confirms the action of the City Clerk of publishing the Notice of Intent to Issue Bonds dated May 19, 1960, and reading as follows:

NOTICE OF INTENT TO ISSUE BONDS

TAKE NOTICE, that the City Council of the City of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, intend to issue a resolution for the issuance of Special Assessment Bonds of the City in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding Ninety Thousand and (\$90,000.00) Dollars for the purpose of acquiring property and the payment of the same for offsetting parking facilities consisting of drainage structure, retaining walls and appurtenances in the block bounded by Grand River Ave., Farmington Road, Orchard and Grove Streets.

Said bonds shall be both an obligation of the Special Assessment District and a general obligation of the City of Farmington.
