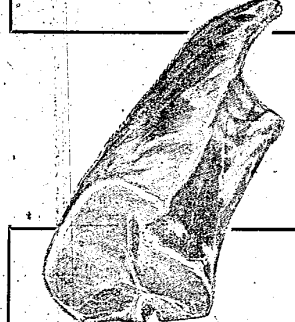

Crowd Pleased With Victory At Homecoming

It was a royal victory for Homecoming Queen Pat Gillespie and her court last Friday as the Farmington Falcons displayed a strong second half aerial assault in vanquishing the Pontiac Northern Huskies by the score of 13-7.

The Huskies threatened late in the final stanza and were within nine yards of pay dirt again. But on the fourth down pass into the Farmington end zone defensive halfback Dick Johnston came up with a stellar play by leaping high to spoil the Northern attempt. Farmington took over possession of the ball and ran out the remaining minutes of the game.

In other league action, previously unbeaten Waterford was cooled off by Thomas-less Walled Lake 20-7, and Berkley beat Southfield 6-0.

Tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 Farmington will entangle with the Blue Jays of Southfield on Bell Field. The general consensus is that feathers should fly!

As the fourth quarter got under way Hazel Park scored with another touchdown pass to put the Rockets down 14 points.

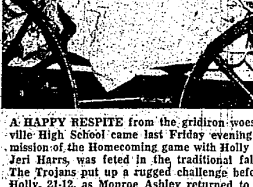
