**Middlebelt PTA Program Nov. 5 To Be on Space**

David H. Fox, chief engineer of the development, planning advanced projects organization, Chrysler Corporation, will give a talk to the Middlebelt PTA on Monday, November 5, at 8:15 p.m., entitled "Space Flight."

He will take all into the future of the fast moving Space Program. To set the stage, however, and establish some basis of measurement, the rapid pace of space flight development, a brief history of Rocketry up to and including the most recent flight of Commander Walter Schirra will be covered.

In addition, through the use of a National Aeronautics and Space Administration color and sound film entitled "Steps to Saturn," Fox will present briefly the missions of such spacecraft as "Ranger," "Surveyor," and "Apollo," and will describe the configuration and size of the spacecraft and launch vehicle. Fox will also talk about the general configuration of future "Nova" boosters which is capable of launching manned vehicles clear to the moon.

The program will be preceded by a short business meeting, presided over by PTA president, Charles Ewald.

At the October meeting, Robert Rowe, principal of Middlebelt, introduced the teachers to the group of parents assembled. He also gave a talk on the ungraded system of classes for the lower grades.

The officers for the new year besides Ewald are: Father, Vice-President, John Oldham; Mother, Vice-President, Betty McCoy; Teacher Vice-President, Mrs. Laughlin; Secretary, Janet Meir; Treasurer, Dorothy Ralston. The program theme is "What's Ahead," and many programs have been set with this in mind.
