

## Recommend 2 Zoning Changes

One of these is the rezoning of an approximately 164-acre parcel on the west side of Orchard Lake Road just south of 14 Mile. The property is presently zoned for single family residential development.

The owners have requested the necessary rezoning to permit them to put a theatre-in-the-round and motel on the property as well as providing for the necessary parking for these establishments.

communities and would be available, it needed, to make fire runs for the Township during their regular shifts. The company maintains both an afternoon and a day shift.

"The Township will gain a ready standby by volunteer staff, capable of answering fire calls over a 16 hour period with no delays," Hall said.

Leonard Laughlin, an official at the Company, has experience as a Fire Chief and the Farmington Township Fire Chief. George Hume, lives directly across the street from Star Out-ter.

The Company is offering the Township a separate area of the plant which will be relinquished off from the working portion in which to house Township fire equipment and store gear used by the firemen.

"Delivery of the City's new fire truck, expected early next year, would displace the Township truck from its present quarters at the Liberty Street Station."

THE TOWNSHIP NOW maintains four fire stations. The Liberty Street Station is the number one department. The others are: (2) Northwestern Highway between 14 Mile Road and Middlebelt; (3) Whetzel Street between Grand River and Independence; and (4) 12 Mile Road between Farmington and Drake Roads.

With the relocation of the Liberty Street Township Fire Station, all four stations will be geographically situated to serve the four sections of the Township.

The Township will pay \$60 a month for their new fire quarters while the cost of the space with the City was \$400 a year.

PROVISIONS FOR the maintenance and management of the system which the Township contracts under the ordinance are to be transferred to the Oakland County Department of Public Works. An agreement to effect the transfer is now in the final stages of drafting and will be acted upon by the Board when it is ready for adoption.

The action taken by the Board culminated months of planning and preparation during which public hearings were held for each of the special assessment water districts, both on the necessity for the water system and on cost estimates for its construction.

TRUSTEE THOMAS A. DUKE said the Board has to considerable credit should be given Township Supervisor Curt Hall for his efforts in obtaining approval for the water system.

"This is a much needed capital improvement which many officials in the past have failed to serve to but have failed to achieve," Duke said. "Only hard work and determination made it possible at this time," according to Duke.

It was brought out by the Board that plans were first started for such a water system in the Township as far back as 1944 and have been considered by previous administrations since that time.
