To Show Film 'Martin Luther'
 "Martin Luther," the widely acclaimed feature motion picture which deals with the 16th century Reformation leader, will be shown at the Middlebelt Elementary School, Ten Mile Rd. and Middlebelt, Saturday, November 10, at 7:30 p.m.
 The film will be sponsored by the Lutheran Church of the Incarnation, through the efforts of Lutheran Social Services of Michigan. It was announced by the Rev. George Stegmier. No admission will be charged.
