FHS Stalwarts Loom Big for Raider Eleven

The 1962 grid campaign at Farmington Senior High and North Farmington will be climaxed Friday afternoon on the Falcon gridiron as the two schools meet for the first time. The 3:30 p.m. contest will pit the two high school football teams in the Farmington School District together in a neighborhood series that promises to grow into a great rivalry.

The Raiders have posted a 6-3 won-loss record so far this season while the Falcons have won 4, lost 3 and tied once going into Friday's season finale.

The Falcon Eleven coached by Jack Hayes will depend heavily on the performance of six stalwarts: Harry Walkley, Dick Johnston, Joe Clapper, Dale Pitcock, Bill Freeman and Bob Clappison, who all play both offensively and defensively.

JIM ACITELLI, Al Voss, Lee Martilla and Bob Huth go both ways for the Raiders, coached by Ron Holland, who has relied heavily on the unit substitution system. Martilla and Bill Hall alternate the quarterbacking job for the Raiders while Tom Kaufman guides the Falcons.

The heavier Falcon line will be out to contain the Raider running attack which has shown good speed and depth so far in eight previous games.

Regardless of the outcome tomorrow, all of the Raider squad is due back next year to haunt the Falcons since North Farmington does not have a senior class while several Farmington Senior High griddees will be playing their final game for FHS.

Falcons Rout Bentley In Warmup for Raiders

As a result of last week's 20-14 thrashing of Livonia - Bentley, Farmington will carry a three game winning streak into tomorrow's game against the Raiders of North Farmington High School.

The alertness of the Falcon defense proved to be the downfall of Bentley as Farmington intercepted four Bulldog passes, two by halfback Dick Johnston.

However, the most spectacular interception was pulled off by 6', 170 lb. guard Greg Gebben, who gathered in a Bentley screen pass late in the third quarter and dashed 45 yards for the final Farmington touchdown, and the first of his high school career.

Something was missing from the powerful Falcon running attack which cut loose two weeks ago against Southfield, but it was still enough to stun the lowly Bulldogs, who have been in the doghouse all season with eight straight losses.

Farmington struck first midway in the first quarter when quarterback Tom Kaufman threw a six yard touchdown pass to end Dale Pitcock, who made an excellent leaping catch of the ball. The attempt for the extra point was wide, and the Falcons owned a 6-0 lead.

There were no other scoring threats until the middle of the second quarter when defensive back Bill Freeman picked off a Bulldog pass on the Bentley 40 yard line and ran it back 15 yards to the 25 yard line. Then, on the first play from scrimmage, Roy Leach burst through

the middle of the line and into the end zone for his seventh touchdown of the season. Mike Gilder put his right foot to good use this time and converted the extra point to make the score at halftime 13-0. With only tomorrow's game remaining, Leach and Gilder together have scored 49 points, nearly one half of Farmington's season total.

At the start of the third period, Farmington set up Bentley's first score when the Bulldogs recovered a Falcon fumble on the Farmington 40 yard line. Taking full advantage of this error, Bentley fullback John Tiano raced the full distance on the very first play. The try for the extra point, however, failed and, left the score at 13-6.

With 5:33 left in the third quarter, Harry Walkley recovered a Bentley fumble on the Bulldog 15 yard line, thus setting up an excellent opportunity for the Falcons to strengthen their lead. However, their attack was thwarted, and Bentley took over possession of the football.

With 40 seconds left in the quarter, it was time for Gebben's heroics. After he had snatched the Bentley pass and run for the score, Gilder again added the extra point. This put Farmington ahead 20-6.

Bentley powered back in the final period and had the ball on the Farmington one yard line with first down and goal to go. The TD Three straight times the stalwart defensive line threw back the ball carrier, but on the fourth attempt

Tiano blasted over for the score. Once again the PAT attempt failed. After the kickoff Bentley intercepted a Kaufman pass, but Johnston quickly brought the ball back to the Falcons with his second interception of the game.

Forced to punt, Farmington's Freeman got off a high, long kick down to the Bentley 15 yard line. As in seven previous contests, time ran out on the Bulldogs, and the Falcons raised their season record to 4-1.

Tomorrow's game, the final for both teams, will match a pair of teams who have both given impressive performances. The Raiders, comprised of juniors and sophomores, finished a respective third place in the Tri-River League behind Riverdale and Cherry Hill.

North Farmington's top runner is Jim Aitelli, who has been nothing short of spectacular this season for the brown and gold. Besides scoring touchdowns and preventing opponents' TDs, Aitelli also kicks field goals and extra points.

The Raiders also have a pair of capable quarterbacks in Lee Martilla and Bill Hall. This is one game not to miss, for it should be filled with both excellent running and passing from both squads.
