

# Twp. Pair Fight, One Is Wounded

A Farmington Township man was wounded in the stomach by a shot fired while he scuffled with another man during an argument in the early morning hours of Tuesday, November 13.

According to Farmington Township Police, Patrick Hawley, 35, of 20807 Robinson Street, shot the gunshot victim, Marvin Ferguson, 37, of 20830 Puritan in Livonia, came to his home and banged on the door about 2:35 a.m. to complain about some repair work Hawley had done on his car.

The PAIR SCUFFLED and Hawley's gun discharged wounding Ferguson, who was taken to Mt. Carmel Hospital at a request for treatment of a superficial wound in the stomach.

Hawley told police he intended only on shooting at the door to scare Ferguson. He was released after making a preliminary statement to Oakland County Prosecutor, George Taylor and pending a statement from the wounded man.

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# St.'s Proposed Constitution Checks Power of Executives

In at least three instances the proposed new Michigan constitution recognizes the growing power of executive and administrative agencies in state government and provides safeguards for the people against unreasonable enforcement of their regulations.

A section of the Declaration of Rights includes new language which reads: "The right of all individuals, firms, corporations and voluntary associations to fair and just treatment in the course of legislative and executive investigations and hearings shall not be infringed."

This declaration was interpreted by the convention to impose upon the executive department, the legislature and the courts the task of developing fair rules of procedure appropriate to investigations and to guarantee fair and just treatment in such matters.

A NEW SECTION in the Legislative Article permits the legislature to appoint a joint committee to act between sessions and to suspend until the end of the next regular legislative session any rule or regulation of an administrative agency promulgated when the legislature is not in regular session.
