### 3 Auto Mishaps Occur in Twp. On N'western

Three auto accidents were reported by Farmington Township Police this week which resulted in serious injuries to three persons. All of the accidents occurred on Northwestern Highway between 14 Mile and Inkster Road.

Charles A. Borst, 22, of 36441 Lyman in Farmington was taken to William Beaumont Hospital for treatment of injuries he suffered when his car went off the road between 14 Mile and Middlebelt on Northwestern Highway Sunday, November 11, Borst, whose car struck a concrete abutment, apparently ran asleep, at the wheel. The accident occurred at 5:48 a.m.

Wade Sloane, 42, of 30015 Raveston in Farmington, told police a car passed him on Northwestern Highway between 13 Mile and Inkster, causing him to lose control of his own car and go into the ditch. The accident occurred Wednesday, November 7, at 10:45 a.m.

A car driven by a 17 year old Union Lake youth crashed into the steel post holding a sign in front of the service station at Northwestern and Middlebelt Saturday, November 10, at 1 p.m. A passenger in his car, Don R. Michels, 16, was injured and needed medical attention.

### Liquor License Approved by Bd.

The Farmington Township Board approved the application of Kirkpatrick's Market, 22571 Middlebelt, for a SDD license from the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

The Board had turned down the request earlier this year because inadequate parking was provided at the location, it was felt.

Attorney Sylvester J. Pheasant told the Board Kirkpatrick's Market had purchased adjoining land and was in the process of establishing a larger parking area.

research studies conducted by the Oakland County Department of Public Works.

The County referred to studies made in Cincinnati, the Gordon MacDougall Report to Wayne County, and the Manual of Septic Tank Practice Publication No. 828 of the United States Health Department for source information before enacting their sewer ordinance on April 17 of this year.

The Oakland County DPW has helped formulate recent capital improvement water and sewer projects in Farmington Township.

Sewer tap in fees have been set at a rate of \$81.50 per trailer and \$250.50 per home. The tap in fee for homes connecting up for water in the Township is \$75. Under the proposed water program, trailers would pay slightly more than one-third per cent of this \$75 tapping fee or about \$33.50.

IT WAS POINTED OUT by Duke that if the court ruled in favor of Cox, paying the fee for the planned 70-unit expansion of the Farmington Trailer Court, the Township stands to lose under the existing rate system for sewer and water tap-ins.

Duke, who is a prominent area builder in addition to being the core of the existing Farmington Township Board Trustee (a non-paying job), also charged that trailer parks do not pay their fair share of capital improvements and property taxes.

The Board raised the question as to whether such a resolution as proposed by Duke would not be construed as regressive and discriminatory on trailer parks.

In answer, Duke stated the present situation is entirely the other way around at the expense of homeowners and prospective home buyers who are faced with the Township's sewer and water connection fees.

"Benefits from the sewer and water services in the Township are the same for both property owners and trailer park residents and both should be charged the same," Duke said.

The present rate system is wholly inequitable," he stated.

Brennan pointed out that one of the contentions offered in the pending lawsuit is that the land Cox proposes to use for expanding his trailer park is unsuitable for residential development.

"If the adjoining land is blighted for residential purposes," Brennan said, "the trailer park made it so."

Duke asked Township Clerk Floyd Cairns to draft up a sample resolution for the next regular Township Board meeting, Monday evening, November 25, for consideration by the Board. No date has been set in Oakland County Circuit Court in Cox's lawsuit against the Township.

### NFHS Staff to Get Study Time

Granting time-off to members of the teaching staff at North Farmington High in order to afford them time during regular school hours for necessary study work and briefing in connection with getting the new high school accredited by next year when North Farmington will have its first graduating class is important. There was reluctance expressed by two or three Board members to granting time off, as requested, to handle matters relative to this.

It was explained by administrators during discussion that separate committees have been working long and hard after school hours for several months now on various projects necessary to become an accredited school. Combined meetings of the total staff are now very desirable but almost impossible to arrange and get good attendance at during after school hours. Supl. G. V. Harrison explained.

The final decision was to grant three half-days off for joint staff meetings with regard to studies and briefings on gaining accreditation. The only negative vote on a motion to allow this time off was cast by Trustee Herbert Neal.

### Use of Children Request Denied

A request by officials of the local muscular dystrophy organization for permission to distribute literature by means of school children was denied by the Board of Education Monday night.

Officials of the organization were hopeful that they would be allowed to send home material through school children which would be helpful to them in raising funds during their annual fund raising project scheduled to get underway shortly.

It was explained during a discussion period prior to the Board's action that the general practice has been not to let any groups or organizations, regardless of how worthy their cause might be, use school children to aid their cause. Children being allowed to bring canned goods for the Good Cans Christmas project and allowing March of Dimes collectors to be put in school offices were cited as the only exceptions to this policy.

### Run Into Snag On Repair Work

Plans for a substantial amount of sidewalk and driveway blacktopping repair work at various schools in the Farmington district ran into a snag, members of the Board of Education were informed at their regular meeting Monday night.

The work was split between two different firms when the contracts were awarded two weeks ago. The report given Monday disclosed that one of these firms felt that they did not do the work assigned to them at the price quoted. The claim made by this firm was that their bidding had then come down with the understanding that all the jobs were to go to one contractor.

The Board's decision Monday night was to let the other firm get sidewalk repair work done at the Eagle and Gil schools yet this year and leave the balance of the work yet to be done until next spring. New bids would be taken at this time, it was indicated.

### Propose Use of IBM Equipment

The use of IBM equipment for handling the ever increasing job of getting the school payroll taken care of and necessary records on pay maintained for all employees has been proposed by the administrative staff for the Farmington public school system.

An outline of how an IBM system can be adopted by working in conjunction with the Oakland County Board of Education and utilizing the larger and more complex IBM equipment it has made to the Board of Education Monday night.

Board members reacted favorably to the proposal but decided to delay any action until more detailed information is provided for them.

### Get 3rd Quarter Sales Tax Due

Sales tax diversion funds due the cities, townships and villages of Oakland County for the third quarter of this year have now been distributed, an announcement made this week by County Treasurer Charles Sparks disclosed.

Farmington Township received \$44,413.95 based on a 1960 census of 25,530 and the City of Farmington, \$11,972.50 on the basis of a 1960 census of 11,972.50.

Wood Creek Village with a census of 681 received \$1,190.01 and Quakertown Village, with a population of 482 as of 1960, a sum of \$838.65.

### Get Diploma

The awarding of two general educational development diplomas was approved by the Board of Education Monday night. Recipients are John A. Clingan and Michael J. Guilmotte.

### Delay Action on Re-Zoning Request

Final payment to the contractor for construction of the new Flinders elementary school is being withheld pending completion of some re-zoning work.

A report made by Byron Oliver, administrative assistant, to the Board of Education Monday night disclosed that at least six or seven re-zoning jobs that had been specified to be done were not yet satisfactorily taken care of.

### CHS Phys. Ed. Plans Considered by Bd.

Preliminary sketches for the proposed Clareneville High School physical education facilities were presented to the Clareneville Board of Education, November 8, in the presence of a number of high school staff members.

The sketches were returned to the architects for further study, revision and a later presentation after the Board discussed them for two hours.
