Mrs. Gentile, who has been an official observer at the United Nations under a grant from the Ford Foundation spoke on "The Changing United Nations."

MRS. GENTILE spoke with affection of her contacts with Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, who had died just the day before, and of the influence this outstanding woman had on the policies and the members of the U.N. She spoke about many things equally important to the growth and development of this very important organization.

She stressed the need for the United Nations to continue to grow, and that it cannot solve problems in a few hours when the governments involved spend months and years in creating these problems before asking for U.N. help. She spoke of WHO and UNESCO and the tremendous work that these groups accomplish among the

world's sick and hungry.

MRS. GENTILE HAS recently returned from the U.N. in New York and in the past has chaired the U.N. in Rome, Geneva, and Paris. She has also been an official delegate to the United States Commission for UNESCO conferences, and a member of the speakers research committee for the United Nations.

Members of the audience were encouraged to ask questions at the close of her talk.
