6. That city, township and school officials will make even greater efforts to keep expenditures down. Although we feel they have done a relatively good job in the past, there are still some unnecessary expenditures that should be climinated.

Few editorial writers ask for or expect overwhelming agreement to editorial comment outside of editorial platitudes in behali of motherhood, country and God. Outside of these areas, the going is often rough. Such editorials are written with the knowledge that they may not be accepted by everyone or by anyone.

It's one person's or a group of persons' biased opinion. An editorial is like a personal column, a message from a merchant to readers of his advertisement or the opinion one neighbor offers another over a cup of coffee.

No attempt is made to assume a position of fence-straddling. Editorials and personal columns traditionally are comments urging a particular course of action. Animenting an action of praising an action. Such messager space is intended to influence opinion. Almost everybody has ideas and opinions. Ar editorial writer is no different except that he has the opportunity—

and the duty—to place such opinions in general print.

Such published opinion serves only as a measuring stick. Readers are not forced to believe editorials any more than they are forced to accept the opinions of a neighbor.

Editorials are intended to, jog, to inspire, to cause people to measure their own opinions against those of the writer. They are intended to bring to the attention of readers situations about which readers might not otherwise be familiar.

To a degree, this is still a land of free hought. Editorial writers have the freedom to write what they believe to be true. Readers have the additional freedom to publish their own counter-attack to an editorial in a letter to the editor. And of course, the editor still has the right to continue believing what he wrote in his editorial.

This is a freedom that thelps make america tick. The absence of controversial subjects in newspaper editorials wouldn't necessarily mean that all things are well with the city, county, state or nation. 
