Will Observe Student Night

Student Night will be observed Sunday, December 30 at 7 p.m. at the Southfield Community Church, 2122 Indian between Beech and Inkster, north of Eight Mile according to Pastor Raymond Bayne.

An annual event of the church, the service features its young people in college and Bible school with special participation by those attending school out of town.

Others are at Wayne, Wheaton, and other schools.

The collegiate group of the church is under the direction of Reverend and Mrs. Earle Rosenberg, and meets every other Sunday night after the church service.

The church will have a Watch Night service on New Year's Eve from 11 a.m. to 12 p.m. preceded by a time of fellowship and refreshments at 9:45.

Sunday Sermon On Redemption
