More Land for City—Official action was taken by the City Council Monday night approving the purchase of the Durham property in the southwest quadrant of the downtown business section.

Equalized Valuation—Equalized valuations for Farmington City and Township combined, announced by the County Equalization Committee this week, totaled just under \$99 million.

Twp. Hall Plans—At a special session last Thursday evening, the Farmington Township Board gave its official approval to plans for a new Township administration building.

Yewee Tree Planting—The Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce took another giant step toward completion of their Community Development Program by planting trees along Grand River Avenue in downtown Farmington.

May Paving Work Begins—Construction crews began preparing the roadway for paving on Shawnessee and Power Avenues this week. New concrete surfaces will replace the black top along the City's portion of the two thoroughfares.

Alternate Quigley Plan—An alternate plan to permit the expansion of the Quigley Machine Products Company plant on Grand River at Lido Street without being detrimental to nearby residential properties has now been worked out.

Fluoride Treatments—The Farmington Junior Chamber of Commerce started the ball rolling for fluoride treatments in the Farmington School District elementary schools by contributing funds to initiate the volunteer health program.

Town Hall Sale—The Farmington City Council rejected the first asking price by the Township on the old Town Hall. The \$100,000 price tag was set as a preliminary

New Administrator—The appointment of Byron Oliver, principal of the O. E. Dunckel Junior High School, to the administrative position for the entire Farmington School District was unanimously approved by the Board of Education June 12.

Ground Breaking—Farmington Township officials gathered with architects and builders June 19 to break ground for the new Township offices at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake Road.

Boost in State Aid—Newly adopted state aid legislation, decided upon after some stormy sessions in both the House and Senate, is now being welcomed by local school officials as a real life-saver for the Farmington public school system.

Tax Vigilantes—Farmington City and Township officials united for a motorists' fund appeal to raise money in the suburban communities fight against the City of Detroit's proposed income tax to be levied on non-residents.

Tax Collections Pipe Line Sold To Consumers

(Continued from Page 1-A) The General Property Tax Law, Sec. 47.

ON TAXES assessed against real property, which is all homes and buildings occupied by business establishments as well as vacant property, the deadline for paying without penalty is Saturday, January 19. After this date you will not be able to pay your taxes at the local clerk's offices but a 4% penalty will be charged for city taxpayers and a 3% penalty for those in the township.

The deadline date for paying taxes locally is February 28. After this date it will be necessary to go to the Oakland County treasurer's office to make payment. Additional interest charges for each month that the delinquency is after February 28 will also be made. The additional charge is one-half of one percent each month.
