Petition Drive

A group of local petition bearers working in cooperation with the Vigilance Tax Committee of Michigan has planned to conduct a door-to-door campaign in an effort to gain signatures to block the move by Detroit's Common Council to levy an income tax on non-residents who work in that City.

Heating by Gas

Specified plans by architects calling for gas heat in the new East Junior High School were unanimously approved by the Board of Education.

New Bus Schedule

A proposed new bus schedule to provide better service for residents of the Farmington area has been set up by the Great Lakes Transit Company which serves this area and endorsed by the City Council on a 30-day trial basis.

Landmark Doomed

The City Council has authorized City Manager John Dinan to seek bids on the demolition of the old grist mill on State Street just west of Farmington Road. The Old Mill has been a landmark in the community for more than 60 years but past out of its original use several years ago and has been a storage place for the City's Department of Public Works since then.

School Enrollment

Enrollment figures for the start of the fall term in the Farmington public school system show an increase of 852 pupils over the total at the beginning of the 1961 fall term. Enrollment now stands at 10,659 students.

Open New Branch

First Federal Savings of Detroit has opened a branch office in Farmington. One of the features of the Open House celebration will be a display of one million dollars in cash.

October

New Industry

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new Chesley Industries Plant were conducted on the site just north of Eight Mile and east of Farmington Road in the City. The new plant, which is being built in a consolidation and expansion movement involving six Chesley-owned factories in Southfield, Detroit will cost approximately 185 people.

Voter Interest High

New registrations taken by City and Township Clerks indicate the heaviest vote for an off-year General Election may be recorded in the community on November 6. New registrations totaling 481 have been since the August Primary by the City Clerk, boosting the total number of registered voters in the City to an estimated 3,800. The Township Clerk's office handled more than 1,200 new registrations in the same period, to hike the total number of registered voters in the Township to approximately 13,600.

Home Building Up

Residential home building in the Township increased markedly during the third quarter over what it was for the same three-month period in 1961. A total of 80 new homes were put under construction between August 1 and September 30, a 50 per cent increase over the third quarter of 1961.

New Bus Loop

An expanded bus schedule to provide greater and better transportation service for residents in the southern portion of the community has been put into operation by the Great Lakes Transit Corporation.

New Bank Site

The organizers of a new Metropolitan National Bank of Farmington have announced their independent bank will be located on the site formerly occupied by the Earl Vivier Oldsmobile Dealership. Earl Vivier, who has been in business in Farmington since 1925, plans to go into retirement.

November

Town Hall Sale

It has been announced that appraisal work on the old Town Hall, jointly owned by the Township, City and Masonic Lodge, has been completed and the three interested parties have indicated they plan to take bids on the public sale of the property, located on the northwest corner of Grand River and Farmington Road.

DPW Moving

The Farmington City Department of Public Works and Water Department has begun moving into their new building on Nine Mile Road just west of Farmington Road. Their former quarters in the Old Mill on State Street will be razed to provide additional off-street parking for the Downtown Farmington area.

Township Project

The Farmington Township Board has passed an ordinance which will provide for the establishment, operation and maintenance of a water supply system to serve seven special assessment water districts in the Township.

Knotty Problem

The Farmington Democratic Headquarters located in the Hatton's Hardware Store on Grand River were found by City Clerk Trent Quinn to be illegally within the limits of a polling place. According to State election laws, no political campaigning can be done within 100 feet of a polling place on election day. The Democrats countered with the charge it was all "Republican harassment."

There was a record turnout of voters for an off-year election in Farmington City and Township with a combined total of 12,247 voters cast out of the total of 17,333 registered. Just under 83.6 per cent of the registered voters in the City turned out while 74.4 per

cent of the Township's registered voters cast ballots in the election, which saw Republican candidates win with ease.

City Gets Grant

Approval has been given by the federal government on the City of Farmington's application for a \$62,500 grant to defray half the cost for a new municipal building.

Grid Rivalry Upset

The underdog North Farmington High football team scored a surprising 7-0 victory over the Falcons of Farmington Senior High in the first gridiron meeting of the two schools.

UF Fund Drive

Farmington City and Township fell just 523 short of the \$18,875 goal set for this year's United Foundation Torch Drive campaign.

School Dedication

The new Flanders Elementary School which was opened with the start of school this fall has been officially dedicated.

Oppose Re-zoning

A unanimous voice of opposition to the proposed re-zoning of the northwest corner of Grand River and Farmington Road from residential and parking to commercial was registered at an initial public hearing before the City Plan Commission. The Re-zoning was sought to pave the way for the public sale of the land, but residents want the old Town Hall situated there to remain intact as a community landmark.

December

Move Twp. Offices

Farmington Township offices were relocated in the new building at 11 Mile and Orchard Lake Road December 10. The new quarters will also house the Township Police Department.

New NBD Location

The National Bank of Detroit's Farmington branch has announced plans for the relocation of its offices to a site on the northwest corner of Alta Loma and Farmington Roads where a completely new building will be erected.

School Millage

Voters of the Farmington School District approved by a landslide margin the continuance of the present school tax rate of \$5 per \$1,000 equalized valuation in the school election held December 10. The voter turnout was under 15.5 per cent of those registered.

Pay Hike for Council

A proposition calling for a substantial pay increase for members of the City Council will appear on the ballot for the April 1 election.

Good-fellow Paper Sale

The annual sale of the Good-fellow Paper Sale went over the top of its \$3,500 goal set this year.
