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Big Response To Art Classes

Saturday art classes in the Farmington area have met with a huge measure of success, according to an annual report published by the Detroit Institute of Arts. The classes, sponsored by the Farmington Public Schools and the Founders Society of the Detroit Art Institute were begun three years ago and have attracted more students in the Farmington area than in any of the other co-operating areas.

The next term of classes will begin February 9 with application forms due prior to February 1, 1963. Instructors for the classes bring materials and slides from the files of the Institute that tie in with and enrich the program of art appreciation, art crafts and understanding carried on in the Farmington schools.

AN ADDITIONAL section of first and second grade students will be added this time and will replace a high school section. This was made possible by the increased demand of the elementary children for the classes. Junior high and high school students are invited to attend and participate in classes held regularly at the Institute.

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Sams Opening New Store for This Area

Mayor James Clarkson of Southfield will cut the ribbon at official opening ceremonies at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, January 30.

Yesterday the team journeyed to Piquette Northern for the first round of the year. It featured Farmington against the two other league leading teams, Southfield and Waterford. This meet was of the utmost importance because the winner will be a definite favorite to take the debate tournament title. The results of this important contest will be in next week's issue.

On Thursday, January 17 Farmington will host the final inter-league tournament meet of the season. This is a high honor. Approximately 100 debaters and their coaches will compete. The first round of debaters will commence at 2:00.

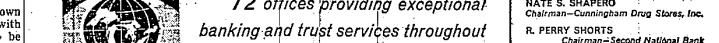
