### City Fencing Ord. Adopted

An ordinance to govern any future erection of property line fencing in the City of Farmington was unanimously adopted by action of the Council at its regular meeting Monday night.

The ordinance spells out in detail the height and type of fencing that will be allowed and even specifies regulations as to how it must be constructed with relationship to which sides of the street the property is located on.

No fencing in front of the front house line will now be permitted. Neither will fencing higher than four feet high be allowed between the front and rear of houses.

It is a very detailed ordinance for anyone planning to construct a fence in the city in the future to study all provisions thoroughly before starting the project.
