McCabe Funeral Home Observes 70th Year Serving N'west Det.

The McCabe Funeral Home this month marks its 70th Anniversary.

Now located at 18750 Grand River, the firm has been situated at five different addresses along Grand River since its early years in Detroit.

MUCH OF Francis McCabe's early success in the profession was due to his family tradition. Memory for names and faces, and for his tremendous drive for hard work. By 1913, his increased business had led to the city's pattern of growth out of Grand River Avenue, he built another new funeral home at 1273 Grand River, with more elaborate offices and facilities. (Reorganization in the city's numbering system later changed the address to 566 Grand River.)

While located at this site, Mr. McCabe became active in business and community groups in the area. He was a member of the Michigan Funeral Home Association, and was also active in several fraternal organizations, and developed an interest in the field of friends and a trait that persisted until his death in 1950.

His son, Clifford L. McCabe, who is now President of the McCabe Funeral Home, was born in 1885 and attended grammar schools and a high school in Detroit. As a boy, he was interested in the horse-drawn hearse over country roads to the cemetery. Even in the coldest, most severe winter weather, he would accompany the older McCabe - sometimes riding under the dashboard of the carriage, huddled under a blanket, while his father guided the horse through the snow.

DESPIITE THIS youthful interest in his father's profession, Clifford first decided to enter the field of banking when he completed his schooling. In 1912, he became an employee of the Detroit Savings Bank, where he worked until he was promoted to Branch Manager by 1921.

By 1927, however, his early association with funeral service, which he had learned from his father, had become a strong influence. He joined his father to assist with the large volume of business that Francis McCabe and

Utilizing the experience he had gained from his father, he opened a branch of the McCabe Funeral Home at 17311 Fenkell to provide service for the many families who were moving into the area. In 1923, he moved to Detroit. This was in 1930.

By 1947, his rapidly growing business prompted construction of the present funeral home on Grand River. In 1951, the building was expanded to include a Memorial Room (dedicated to Francis J. and Eva McCabe), a kitchen, a display room, a large lounge, and additional slumber rooms. The home has been modernized since, and now features four slumber rooms, a gracious main lounge with fireplace, two consultation rooms and a casket display room. According to reports from Mr. Manager, the Memorial Room is now being refurnished to depict more fully the heritage of the McCabe Funeral Home.

A RESIDENT of South Rose Park, Mr. Clifford McCabe now lives at 18350 Faust.

In 1958, Mr. McCabe McCabe, grandson of the McCabe Funeral Home, joined the firm as the third-generation to carry on the family tradition. He has held several executive posts with the MEFA and currently serves as Vice President of District No. 1 and Chairman of The Public Relations Committee.

Also active in the North Rose Park Club Civic Association, Mr. McCabe is a veteran of the World War II. He makes his home in North Rose Park with his wife and two children.
