## OK Gymnastics Coach at NFHS

The Farmington School District Board of Education has approved allocating \$250 a year toward the salary of a gymnastics instructor and coach at North Farmington High School.

Although the sport is not new in Farmington District schools, the action by the Board paved the way for the establishment of a gymnastics program which will become an integral part of the school system's physical education department and includes participation of the North Farmington gymnastics team in interschool competitions this year.

School District Athletics Director John K. Cotton has already completed arrangements for the first interschool gymnastics schedule for the North Farmington team.

Four meets have been slated, the first of which was staged at Ann Arbor on January 12. The next gymnastics meet is slated for North Farmington on January 26, at which time the Raiders will play host to Ann Arbor and Allen Park beginning at 1 p.m.

## Trinity Church Selects Negro To Pastorship

Trinity Episcopal Church of Farmington established a precedent this week by selecting a negro minister for the pastorage, the first of his race to lead an all-white congregation of Episcopalians in Michigan.

The Rev. Joseph A. Pelham, 41, regarded in the Episcopal diocese of Michigan, will assume his new duties this Sunday, January 20. He is presently executive director of the Christian Social Relations Department of the diocese.

CHURCH VESTRYMEN, a council of nine laymen elected to serve three year terms by the congregation, announced Rev. Pelham's appointment last Sunday, January 13, after learning of his decision to take over from the former pastor, Rev. James Guinan, who left the church last October to head a Brighton retreat center of the diocese.
