Louis C. Doyle, Treasurer's Office, Chrysler Corporation, has had sixteen years of intensive experience in the field of financial management, including the installation of budget and cost systems, the development of sales finance programs, and systems and procedures supervision. He joined Chrysler Corporation's Comptroller's staff in 1956 and moved to the Treasurer's staff in 1959 to organize a systems and procedures function. He served as President of Detroit Chapter, Systems and Procedures Association, in 1959-60.

MR. DOYLE is a graduate of Wayne State University where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration in 1947 and a Master's degree in Business Administration in 1959.

Mr. Doyle gives the following description of his course: "This course is intended for those getting started in the systems and procedures field as well as those in businesses, large and small, who would like

"The course will cover a wide range of topics which bear upon the basic responsibilities, techniques, and operations of administrative systems people. Particular attention will be given to organization planning, problem solving and analytical techniques, human relations, design and control, clerical work measurement, data processing systems and operations research. We shall discuss these vital and timely subjects in sufficient depth and detail to be of practical value to you. Case histories will be used and problems from class members will be the subject of informal discussions. Emphasis on the practical will not keep us from giving appropriate attention to the theoretical and interest-broadening aspects of the subjects.

"TIME WILL BE divided between lectures and discussion. You will be encouraged to bring your actual work experience and knowledge into the class to share with other class members. "You will realize immediate and long-range benefits from participating in this course. Taking full advantage of the techniques and ideas presented and getting to know others in the field will promote your personal development and help to lay a more solid foundation for your business career."
