# Dale Pitcock Tallies 27 In 68-64 Cage Triumph

Dale Pitcock and Walt Grimala sparked Farmington to a thrilling 68-64 victory over Walled Lake last Friday as the Falcons pulled into a second place deadlock with the Vikings, two full games behind unbeaten Pontiac Northern.

The Falcons eked out the victory the final minutes of the lead had changed hands 15 times throughout the game. The score was knotted no less than seven times in the second half.

Pitcock, an All-Conference and All-County end in football, enjoyed his best game of his basketball career in collecting 27 points and 17 rebounds. Grimala also shone out by scoring 19 points and snatching off 22 rebounds.

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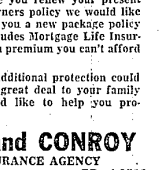
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
