Mrs. Schaefer, a Cranbrook Institute staff member, conducted the planetarium demonstration.

**THE PURPOSE** of this school trip was to better acquaint the children with the material in the study of "Our Heavenly Bodies." Preparation for the trip was begun about two weeks prior to the visit.

Many audiovisual materials were used to aid the children, including textbooks, film strips, library books, sound movies and still pictures.

## Survival Tips In CD Classes

The Emergency Welfare Service is being held in the Senior High School, Shaw wasse on Monday nights at 8 p.m. in Room 116B.

Those attending the orientation session held on Monday, January 22, heard Mrs. Virginia Warren, Coordinator for the Oakland County RWS unit, speak of the necessity for preparations to meet the needs of evacuees and homeless who would arrive in our area in any disaster.

Mrs. Doris Crowder, former secretary to Gen. Eisenhower during the war and interpreter at the Nuremberg trials, spoke of the civil defense methods used in England during the blitz, pointing out that more preparation, more planning could have saved time and lives.

Evacuees children often came into a "safe" town, and were placed in homes after the home-owners were asked, how many bedrooms they had, the answer determining the number of children left there. Evacuees, she pointed out, came in all shapes and sizes, some by chance, were content, while others were miserably unhappy and disrupted the whole family pattern. Some of the children, because of poor registration, were never "found," for time simply did not exist to make all the necessary plans before evacuation began.

Each indicated that the possibility of door-to-door distribution of evacuees is likely in any area, such as wars, near a target city. Until reception center plans can be worked out, teams trained to man them, that possibility remains real indeed.

Basic flexible plans for Emergency Welfare Service are being made for the Farmington township area, these plans must be made before evacuation begins, training must be complete and sound.

Classes will continue for the next nine weeks.
