# FUR AND CHARACTERISTICS

**BEAR MARTEN**  
Soft, dense, silky fur generally found in short and long pelts. Many are tinted in deeper brown than black.

**BEAVER**  
Long, hard guard hair is always broken to reveal dense, silky underfur. Natural color is deep white, beige, gray and pinks.

**CHINCHILLA**  
Short fur, dense, soft and silky with grayish blue, green and black. Originally from South America, currently raised in Peru.

**ERmine**  
Canadian and Russian ermine pelts are highly desirable. Best fur with exceedingly dense, soft, downy underfur and guard hairs. Natural color is white, sometimes brown.

**LINX**  
Long fur, white and pale brown near the skin, tipped with gray or brown at the end of the guard hairs.

**PERMAN LAMB**  
From young Karakul sheep. Usually dyed black or brown to imitate better color than luster. In grey, skins are natural.

**RUSSIAN BROADTAIL**  
In most cases, prematurely horned lambs with flat nose pattern (no shears).

**MINK**  
Soft, light-weight, dense brown fur with long, lustrous guard hairs.

**WILD**  
Trapped in their natural habitat, generally brown in color.

**RANCH**  
Generally dark and silky. Raised under controlled conditions.

**MUTTON**  
Natural colors — brown shades, greys, blacks, white—resulting from careful mating, care and black.

**JAPANESE MINK**  
Shorter guard hair than other mink. Natural color is black, brown or gray. Always dyed to simulate American mink.

**FOX—American, silver, white, blue, red**

**MOITON-PROCESSED LAMB**  
Pelts of fine wool lambs are sheared, dyed and the hair straightened, chemically treated, and permanently set in place. Includes black, blue, water-repellent, close-fitted fur.

**MAINTON**  
Short, buff-colored fur with coarse guard hair. The dyed to simulate expensive furs.

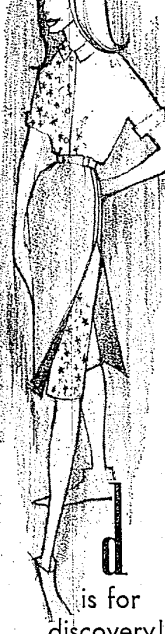
