Exchange Students Tell Of Training They Get

Interested parents and residents attending a recent meeting at Kenbrook School heard exchange students from Belgium, Sweden, Indonesia and Japan describe education in their countries. To many it was the first opportunity to meet and hear anyone from another country. One reaction was "what a sane and realistic way to meet people from other lands, a chance to become friends and know one another." Another was, "when you look into the face of that charming young girl from Japan it seems impossible that we could have ever been at war with her country."

The exchange club has been functioning for three years under the direction of their advisor and moderator Thomas Peace. Kaj (pronounced Ky) Alberts from Sweden explained that only 50% attend kindergarten in that country as it is a private organization. In the fifth year of elementary schooling, English is introduced and in the seventh year, German. At the 8th grade level 50% are graduated to an advanced school where they will now take another language — French. 40% attend a Vocational school and 30% will exit at the 9th grade and go to work. Music is given one hour of instruction per week with emphasis on the appreciation view. There are few clubs in Sweden and more dances.

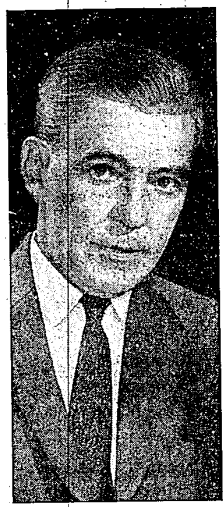
Siti Assandi from Indonesia finds her school hours very different. They have morning sessions from 7 to 10, or afternoons from 2 to 7 and go six days a week. State examinations are given at the end of the sixth year to determine whether a student will pass on to the next grade. Another is given at the end of junior high and one at the second year of senior high and a final one at the end of high school.

Passing these examinations proves graduation. Instead of the students changing classes, the teacher moves from room to room. Religion and morality classes are required.

In Japan, Tokio Tansowa said children can start private kindergarten at age 3. Three semesters make up their school year, running from April to July-September to December and January to March. 50% will attend the University with attendance highest among the boys. Girls continue with schooling that will be more applicable to their lives as mothers and wives. Children in Japan have great respect for teachers and are expected to rise and bow when a teacher enters the room. They believe in the wisdom that comes from experience and age. Tokio believes that Japanese students take their studies more seriously than their American counterparts.

From Belgium, Mickey Duym tells us that after the sixth grade a student is selected for either a Latin Section which will give a student mathematics, Greek, Science, History, Geography and will have almost any chance to enter college. Or, they will enter the Modern Section, which offers business college, commerce or gymnastics. The four countries.
