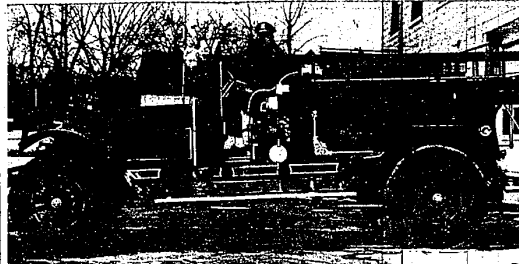

Fire Engine

(Continued from Page 1-A) The City Council became concerned over the evident lack of buyers interested in the old fire engine at their meeting Monday night. They instructed City Manager John Dinan to investigate how much money prospective purchasers would be willing to pay and report back.

THE TRADE-IN VALUE of the old engine is understandable, it would be even more so for a white elephant to a fire engine salesman than it is presently to the City.

With the completion of the new Municipal Building later this year, space is planned to house only two fire engines. At the present time, the three engines are being kept in temporary quarters around the City since the demolition of the old Liberty Street Station is under way.

If prospects of selling the fire truck wane any further, the City may well be faced with donating it to some historical museum rather than continue to have it remain in embarrassing disuse with the Fire Department.

Access Needed, Planners Say

A recommendation has been made by the City's planning consultants that efforts be made to obtain an access road from Orchard Lake Road to Mooney St., between Shiawassee Road and Grand River Avenue.

The planners' feeling is that such a road is needed to service the Farmington Plaza, multiple dwellings and other commercial property on Mooney and that it should be obtained prior to the development of any more vacant land between Orchard Lake and Mooney streets.

The Council instructed the city manager Monday night to contact owners of the remaining vacant land regarding this matter and also owners of the Plaza to see what extent they would contribute to the acquisition of right-of-way.

(Continued from Page 1-A) The cost of purchasing it. The city manager was instructed to contact these owners of adjacent property to see whether they would stand half the cost with the city to buy the land needed. A report was given to the Council Monday night by Manager John Dinan on the results of his negotiations.

Owners of property on the west side of the right-of-way feel that the benefits they receive from having this access do not warrant them standing one-fourth of the total cost of purchase of the land needed. It was revealed in the report.

ATTORNEY Ned Ogelsby who occupies the small Pauline Estate building immediately to the east felt that he could not commit himself on any contribution for the right-of-way until such time as he learns whether he can purchase the building he is in and some way to the rear at a reasonable price, Dinan said.

Joseph Himmelsbach also stated that he would not be able to commit himself as a possible contributor to the purchase of the right-of-way until he learns whether he can get an option on the vacant property behind the Pauline building adjacent to his present building, Dinan added.

The decision to table discussion on this matter at this time was made based on the fact that negotiations for purchase of some property on one side of the right-of-way route have yet to be resolved, it was indicated.

(Continued from Page 1-A) W. Allen Nelson, a citizen in regular attendance at Council meetings, voiced outspoken objection to Council action taking a stand either for or against the opinion that no local governing body had any right to attempt to influence voters thinking either way.

A SECOND request made by the Municipal League was that the city join with other communities in declaring the period from March 23-31 as "Know Your Constitution Week." This request was given wholehearted endorsement by councilmen. It was their feeling that some special efforts should be made to arrange a program for this week to inform citizens about the new constitution to be voted on. Details regarding what might be done were left up to the city manager to work out.

Nelson spoke up again on this proposal. He stated that if any speakers were arranged for to present a program during this week he wanted to have an opportunity to challenge them on points they might make about the beneficial aspects of the new constitution that has been drawn up. There are some good provisions in the proposed new constitution, but also many bad ones, he commented.

Farmington Superintendent Harrison stated Monday of this week that he had been notified by Novi school officials that they had decided to send their ninth graders to Northville rather than having them come here. He said that he felt it was best for all high school pupils from Novi to go to the same school system if adequate facilities can be provided.

The local Board only agreed to accepting the Novi pupils on a tuition arrangement due to the fact that it appeared they might be without a school to attend if they did not, Harrison concluded.
