For your convenience, page 2 of your April, 1963, Area telephone directory will be a handy reference on dialing, starting Sunday, April 7.

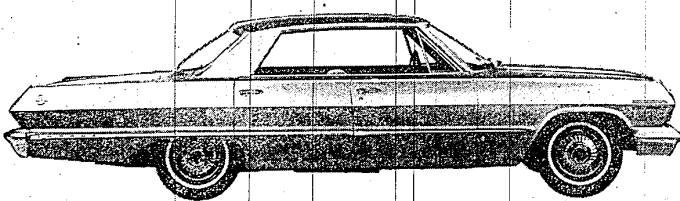
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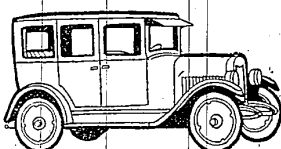
