Eighth Annual Easter Cantata To Be Presented Here April 2

Soloists for the Eighth Annual Easter Cantata to be held in the Farmington High Auditorium on Tuesday evening, April 2, are: Phyllis Daniels, soprano; Mary Ellen Henkel, alto; Dan Karney, tenor; and Walker Wyatt, bass. The 250 voice Cantata chorus accompanied by the Redford City Symphony Orchestra will perform Mendelssohn's "Elijah" oratorio. The program commences at 8 p.m.

PHYLIS M. DANIELS comes to the Cantata Series for the first time and brings with her an extensive background in music experiences. She plays the part of the "Widow Woman" in the "Elijah". Miss Daniels has been soloist at the Transylvania Music Camp in Brevard, North Carolina, and soloist with the Charlotte Symphony Orchestra in Charlotte, N.C. She has a Master's degree in Voice from the University of Michigan where she has done

Dan Karney, tenor, returns to perform on the Cantata Series for the sixth time. This very popular tenor brings to Farmington a stirring record of performance as soloist with the United States Army Chorus from Coast to Coast and on radio and TV networks. He has made many appearances with the Chorus in Washington, D.C. for official functions, including many appearances at the White House. Mr. Karney plays the part of "Obadiah" in the "Elijah" oratorio. He specializes in sacred solo work and has given over 100 such concerts in Michigan and other states. He recently performed the "Creation" at the Christ Methodist Church in the "Seven Last Words" at the First Baptist Church of Wall Lake.

He is currently the soloist at the Christ Methodist Church in Highland Park, and is Director of Interpretation for the Metropolitan Detroit Council of Churches.

WALKER WYATT, bass, plays the leading role of "Elijah". Mr. Wyatt returns to Farmington for the second time. His first appearance having been two years ago when he sang the bass solo parts in Faure's Requiem. He recently performed with the University of Michigan opera society in the performance of Albert Lortzing's "The Hunters", a German opera of the 19th Century.

He is currently pursuing an opera career and working toward his doctorate in music. Mr. Wyatt was well received two years ago and brings to Farmington his rich background of knowledge and expert treatment of the operatic and oratorio scene.

Along with the Redford Symphony orchestra, Mrs. William Feucht and Diane Davidson, Farmington senior, will be accompanying at the piano-forte. Richard Seely, chairman of ticket sales reported this week that there are strong indications pointing to a capacity audience for the evening of April 2.
