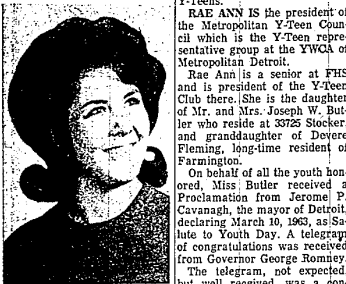


Rae Ann Butler Honored In YWCA Salute to Youth

Cville Board To Sell Bonds

At its meeting held Thursday, March 14, the Glareneville Board of Education took action setting April 4 as the date for opening bids for the sale of \$1.5 million in school bonds.

The bonds will be used for the construction of additional school facilities and buying equipment as well as for remodeling work. The Clareneville Board's action came just two days after the Municipal Finance Commission had issued its order approving the sale. The school attorney who is present at the regular meeting was instructed to proceed with the necessary advertising of this sale.

Hopes are that construction on the various projects planned can be started this first part of May. It is anticipated that on April 4 action will be taken establishing dates for taking of construction bids on at least some of the projects.
