Favor Colfax As Main Road

The Board of Education adopted a formal resolution Monday favoring a proposal by the City of Farmington's planning consultants that Colfax Street be made a major collector roadway running all the way from Farmington Road to Orchard Lake Road in the township.

The road leads to the Flanders elementary school between Eight and Nine Mile Roads and some school property at this site would have to be deeded over if this were developed into a major thoroughfare.

At the present time this is not a continuous roadway and some sections of road would have to be laid in the township. The city's planners feel it would be wise to make this a major continuous artery for vehicular traffic.

The resolution offered by Trustee Herbert Neal was unanimously adopted. The administration was instructed to forward copies of the resolution to both the City Council and Township Board.

City voters will also have a local proposition to ballot on. They will be asked to approve a pay increase for councilmen to \$500 each per year.

While there will also be candidates for state offices to be decided on, little voter interest can these candidates has been expressed locally. There are two justices of the supreme court to be picked as well as two regents for the University of Michigan, two members for the board of trustees at Michigan State University and two for the board of governors at Wayne State University. A state superintendent of schools and a member to the state board of education is also to be selected. City Clerk Frena Quinn and Township Clerk Floyd Cairns both urge any voters who are not certain about what to precinct they vote in to call them immediately to find out and not wait until election day. Do not confuse city and township precincts with the buildings you go to when voting on local school proposals or candidates, it has been reminded.

(Continued from Page 1-A) and signs. Last year \$27,580 was earmarked for this purpose while this year's budget calls for a total expenditure of \$22,120 or \$5,460 less.

The major portion of funds to satisfy this budget will come from two sources \$123,818 from property taxes and \$177,200 from state sales tax revenues.

In past years public hearings on the township's proposed budget have been held, but none is scheduled this year. Last year only three citizens showed up for the public hearing on the proposed budget, Supervisor Curt Hall commented.

Warren Piche Is Dead at 41

Warren E. Piche, Jr., died Sunday at the age of 41 after having waged a courageous battle against an incurable kidney ailment which had forced him to take medical leave from his duties in the Farmington school system where for ten years he had worked as a coach and administrator.

Piche, who had been confined in Henry Ford Hospital under treatment, died at 22348 Pembroke in Detroit with his wife, Bernice, a daughter, Catherine, and a son, Steven.

Born in Grosse Pointe, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren E. Piche, Sr., who also survive him, Piche was graduated from Michigan State Normal College.

BEST KNOWN for his role in establishing Farmington's Summer Recreation Program which he directed until illness forced him into a less demanding capacity, Piche first came to Farmington as a baseball coach.

In addition to coaching varsity baseball for several years at Farmington Senior High, Piche handled similar duties with basketball and football teams at the school. In recent years he has worked as a guidance counselor at the O. E. Dunckel Junior High School.

Funeral services were held Wednesday morning, March 27, at 10 a.m. from St. Eugene's Catholic Church, 2031 Berg Road in Detroit. He rested at the Buresh Funeral Home, 13631 Puritan, where services were conducted at 9:35 a.m. on Wednesday. Interment was at Mt. Olivet Cemetery.

(Continued from Page 1-A) fire safety hazard would be caused by doing so. Despite the administration's emphasis that the state fire marshal had approved the gym as being safe for gatherings of this kind, the father insisted that written proof should be presented.

THE PARENTS' suggestion was that since no hall or other gathering place in the community would be large enough, the graduation exercises should be held at a location outside the community.

The Board stated that they were sure that many seniors and their parents would be opposed to a location away from Farmington and the high school and that it would present some serious problems. Transportation to a location away from Farmington was one problem cited. Another was the placing seniors to this hall outside the community for practice sessions. Two or three other disadvantages were also given.
