Sunday School Buys Overseas 'Kiddie Kits'

The Sunday School of Incarnation Lutheran Church will purchase items to make up "Kiddie Kits" for shipment overseas.
Pastor George Stegmier says church banks were distributed to the children on the first Sunday in Lent and will be turned in on Easter Sunday.
THE MONEY the children have saved will be used to purchase the items for the kits. The items in a kit are a writing tablet, pencils, soap, washcloth, towel, toothbrush and comb. Such items that seem to be the common necessities of life for children in this country are highly valued gifts for children in less developed countries.
Lutheran World Relief, through whom the kits will be distributed, stated there is a need for such kits for the children of the school children.
Sunday morning, Miss Beulah of the Philippines will speak in the Bible School hour 9:30-9:45 a.m. and the church service at 11:15 a.m. In the evening, Reverend Orval Dunkel of Roodiana will have pictures at 7 p.m.
THE THEME OF the conference, "So Send I You," has been dramatized on a large 39 foot panel at the front of the church by Mrs. Mildred Rosenberg and members of the committee. Pictures of the United Nations fly in the front of the church. Greeters dressed in the costumes of several nations are at the doors at each service. In the church lobby are several booths displaying curios, pictures, and information about various countries of the world.
Four couples have already gone from the church into missionary work, including Reverend and Mrs. Ross Agnew, and Mrs. Alfred Lackey, and Reverend and Mrs. Orland Thompson to rural pastorates.

Dist. Library Has Books by Local Authors

The Farmington District Library is proud to have available the works of three local residents. The books, which are published in March by the American Concrete Institute: "Formwork for Concrete" (CIP-1) Mary J. Hard, published in March by the American Concrete Institute. 3 - Detroit in 1980; and
4 - Race and Residence in Detroit.
Pamphlets 2, 3 and 4 are concerned with Metropolitan Detroit and are more provocative for all in the suburbs.
Publication of "Profile of a Metropolitan Area" by Robert Mowbray and S. Wright, which was announced for November, 1962, was published early in 1963. This book is the result of many research on ten case studies of Metropolitan Detroit - the decisions and events that took place in the Detroit area from 1945-1960 (a critical period for Detroit residential and commercial areas as well as for the suburbs). Chapter 10 is devoted to Farmington Township and our own "growing pains."
