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Pheney also claimed that rezoning as proposed would be "downgrading" and surrounding property would be devalued.

He challenged Duke's claim that \$8,000 would be spent annually in Farmington by tenants of the proposed apartment house, said the City already had 390 apartments available and suggested a serious traffic problem now in existence would be greatly aggravated under the proposed development.

Others who spoke out against the rezoning proposal were Elmer Rohm of 33251 Valleyview Circle. He submitted maps to the Council designating where the traffic congestion in traffic would result at the planned entrance on Power Road from the proposed apartment house.

John Allan of 32255 Salawassee maintained the existing zoning is adequate and the land in question, in his opinion, is suitable for single family residences, such as have been built in scenic View Subdivision.

John Smith of 32200 Valleyview Circle told the Council that "back of forest" in City planning could prove costly" if flood plain measures were not taken until development reached an advanced stage.

It was suggested by Lewis Leonard of 32375 Valleyview Circle that tax revenue would be lost to the City by the development of homes in the area of the proposed apartment house.

Gerald Grace of 32329 Valleyview Circle claimed an apartment house would offer an "unpleasant aesthetic view" to nearby residents.

Roland Hill of 32267 Valleyview Circle said he moved here to escape such proposed developments. He wants the site left undeveloped or used as an extension of the City Park.

The final objection to the rezoning came from Ed Murray of 32297 Valleyview Circle. He offered to show the Council how slides of the affects from the flooding in his backyard two years ago. He urged the Council to "keep the land open to allow for a natural flood plain."

Mayor Robert Lindbergh closed the hearing after no further citizens requested to voice opinions. Requested by the City Council was a motion that all the facts be considered by the Council and a decision in the case be delayed until the next meeting. The case was supported by Councilman Howard Thayer and the Council unanimously moved to table the rezoning request until the April 15 meeting.

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Propose Day For Seniors in School Offices

A proposal by the government teacher at Farmington Senior High that a student government project be initiated to help students would take over duties of the school board and administrative staff for a day was favorably received by the Board at its meeting Monday night.

The project as proposed would be very similar to the student government day program that has been conducted with the city over the past several years with students filling "mock" positions of all city offices for a day.

It was generally agreed by Board members and the administration that it might be well for any such proposed program to coincide with the city government day held each year. This would permit more students to participate and learn and eliminate the same students being elected for two consecutive years in the different governments.

The administration was instructed to work out details with the city government and also recommended that North Farmington seniors be included in any plans for such programs as this in future years.

year's budget of \$4,629,760 for police and fire protection expenses. The manager has estimated \$1,150 more for snow and ice removal but decreased by \$5,205 the sum set aside for streets and sidewalks.

The 1963-64 proposed budget also sets aside a larger contribution to the Farmington Area Recreation Commission for its summer program to offset expected cutbacks in the amount United Foundation will contribute. Another \$200,000 is earmarked for park improvements.

In several areas of the budget reductions over expenditures being made during the current fiscal year have been made.

The budget has been prepared based on an assessed valuation for the city approximately \$2 million higher than last year. The bulk of the money to satisfy the proposed budget will come from two sources; an estimated \$29,193,840 from property taxes and \$103,000 from state taxes returned to the city.

THE WATER and sewer department budget for 1963-64 for a recommended expenditure of \$120,146 is entirely separate and is satisfied almost totally through water collection fees. The department water rates to satisfy the budget proposal will be necessary.

Approval of a city budget for the coming fiscal year must be made by the Council prior to May 15. A public hearing on the budget will be held prior to its adoption by the Council but no date for this hearing has yet been set.

Authorize Purchase

Action was taken by the Farmington Board of Education Monday night approving the purchase of over \$26,000 more worth of equipment for the new East Junior High under construction.

They also approved \$2,950 more for equipment for the new Highmeadow elementary school.

Promote City to Attract Industry

The Farmington Economic Development Committee has been granted the sum of \$100 from the City Council to help defray expenses for the promotion of Farmington by the committee in its efforts to attract new industry here.
