The Farmington High School baseball team opened their 1953 season last Tuesday afternoon on the Falcon diamond and drew a 1-1 drubbing from Redford Union.

The Falcons, with only one returning letterman from last year's Inter-Lakes Conference champions (Larry Miller), fielded a team with little experience and gave up 13 hits and four errors en route to the non-league defeat.

Pitching for Farmington were Dan Nickliffe (starter), Dale Pitcock, Gary Heist and Bob Lorent (all in relief).

JIM STEVENSON collected both of the Falcon safeties. He boomed out a triple and a single to spoil the record of the Redford Union hurler who struck out 14 Farmington batters.

Falcon coach Steve Branz used Miller, Frisch and Mitch in the outfield; Stevenson (1B), Armstrong (2B), Nielson (SS), Martelli (3B) and Johnston behind the plate. The Falcons play North Farmington tomorrow.


Riders Hit Trail
