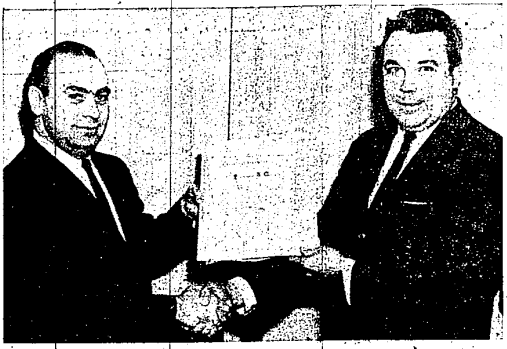
The proposed service extended area service includes most of the west side of Detroit, but if you care to check what area a given telephone number is in, you can refer to the directory. All telephone numbers in areas 1, 4, 5, and 7 are included in the new service plan.

Remember to vote whether you want the new services or whether you wish to keep your existing service.
