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FHS Thincdads Rout North Farmington

The Farmington Thincdads literally trounced on North Farmington's cindermen last Thursday by the score of 70-4 - 30-4.

Individual stars were too numerous to mention although juniors Dennis Hunt and Bill Freeman deserve special mention for their fine performances.

Hunt, after leaving the rest of the mile runners far behind in a cloud of dust, ran against the clock and finished with a fine time of 4:28.7. Freeman could do nothing wrong as he easily sailed over the bar, in one of his best vaults of the year, to equal his old record of 11' 6".

Pete Sartin captured a first in the high jump with a leap of 5' 6". The story was just reversed in the broad jump though as a North Farmington man literally flew through the air for a distance of 19' 3" and three quarter inches and a first place.

Frank Patterson, as was expected, took both the high and low hurdles with a very fast time. Day Radebaugh clipped five seconds off his fastest time as he crossed the finish line of the 880 yd. run in 2:30.0. John Lockwood clipped in with a first place in the 220 yd. dash and speedster Dick Moore took the top spot in the 440 yd. dash with a blistering 0:53.3. Moore showed his heels to everyone except a North Farmington man who finished second with an excellent time of 0:53.4.

Farmington won both the mile relay and the 880 yd. relay with respective times of 3:46.9 and 1:35.5. Altogether the Falcons took 11 first places and five second places.

Baseball Call Out for Boys

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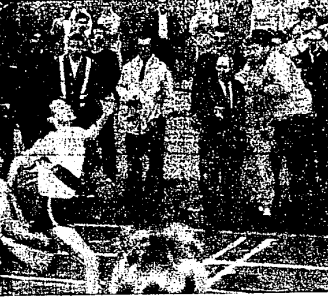
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**CHS Trackmen Keep Winning**

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Monroe Ashley, a pile-driving fullback last fall, was named as a fine 220-yard dash man, winning the event in the Trojan meet with Franklin on April 11. Ashley also has been the anchor man on the Clarensville 880-yard relay team which has been undefeated in three outings.

Record breakers for Clarensville so far this year are Larry Welner who posted a time of 4:47.7 in the mile, shaving 3 off the old record; Jim Donnelly in the broad jump with a record leap of 19' 1 1/2"; which bettered the old mark by 1/2 inch; and David Graves who posted a mark of 5' 10 1/2" in the high jump, bettering the old CHS record of 5' 8 1/2".

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A second distance event standout for Coach Temby is Volker Hamann who captured first place the mile run at the triangular meet against South Lyon and Our Lady of Sorrows on April 9, which opened the track season for Clarensville.

The Trojans will be at Lathrop West Friday, April 26, for a triangular meet which also includes West Bloomfield.

Farmington's sixth man, John Sloane, had a little trouble with his putting in scoring a 58. However, on the final green he announced that he was placing all of his clubs up for sale.

"We just flopped around for nine holes," said Hoppens, "but when the weather gets better, we should shoot at least 11 or 12 strokes better as a team."

Tomorrow afternoon the golfers will engage in a triangular meet with both Waterford and Pontiac Northern at the Pontiac Country Club.
