Install Water Gate Valves

The initial phase of construction in the extension of Detroit water facilities into the Township of Farmington was completed last weekend with no fanfare and almost certainly unnoticed by everyone.

The installation of gate valves into the Eight Mile Road, big Detroit water main was completed during the early hours on Sunday morning at Middle South Road and at Orchard Lake Road. The work was started after midnight and completed by eight o'clock in the morning before most had risen to turn on their taps.

The water had to be shut off while these installations were being made and the decision was that early Sunday morning would be the best time to do this.

The Detroit Water Board had informed township and county officials earlier that they would have to have the gate valves in the new township water districts installed before the peak period of water consumption which begins in May and lasts until late in the fall.

Early installation of the gate valves will insure that the opening up of the water system will not be delayed after lines have all been laid.

Okay Funds for Water Line

Extension of a water line a distance of some 850 feet from the Kimberly South subdivision water line to the new township water districts installed before the peak period of water consumption which begins in May and lasts until late in the fall.

A 12 inch line will be laid at a total cost of \$7,630. This line will become a part of the Detroit water system lines as soon as Detroit water is extended its far north in the township. While this is expected to be a costly before years' end it will probably not be before water is needed at this school when class is started in the fall.

Some of the money to be spent for this line will be reimbursed back to the school district when Detroit water lines are laid since a line as large as 12 inch as is not needed for the water to be used at the school only. Supt. G.V. Harrison emphasized.

An agreement has been made with the township to recuperate the additional cost being borne this time for installing the larger than needed lines, the superintendent of schools said.

Proceeding in this manner will eliminate the need of going to the expense of putting in valves, a storage tank and other equipment needed to supply water from a private school well on a temporary basis only, he concluded.

Hire 17 More New Teachers for 1963-64

The hiring of 17 more new teachers for the 1963-64 school year as recommended by the administration was approved by action of the Farmington Board of Education Monday night.

The appointments approved include 11 elementary teachers, six secondary instructors and one special education teacher.

The granting of a maternity leave of absence to one teacher was also approved.
