A community college campus less than 30 minutes away from my Oakland County high school graduate may be possible in the not loo distant future.

(a) a proposal to establish a community college district and support it with a one mill tax;
(b) a proposal to elect a six-member board of trustees as the government body of the community college district,

Judge Schulte's Tenure Has Spanned 4 Decades

Judge John J. Schulte, Jr., who will step down next January as Parmigton's Municipal Judge to climax a career of 40 years serving on the bench, has a tenure of office which is possibly the longest any Judge has ever held in Michigan.

Judge Schulle came to Farmington in 1924 during the Presidency of Warren G. Harding and was appointed Justice of the Peace for what was then the Village of Farmington. Two years later when the community incorporated as a City, he was
