Select Church Site in Two.

The land site for the proposed Nardin Park Methodist Church expansion in Farmington Township had been approved by the voting body of the Church, at a meeting held May 5.

The recommendation of the Board of Trustees, headed by George C. Higgins, was to purchase property at the southwest corner of 11 Mile Road and Middlefield Road.

The approximately 20-acre parcel of land will be used for the construction of a sanctuary, educational facilities, housing for a chaplain and an assistant pastor, with an area to be developed for off-street parking.

Richard Jeffery of 20338 Wesley Drive in Farmington is representing the owners of the property and the Church in negotiations for the land sale.

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along with the roadway change itself was \$30,000.

It was agreed earlier that the installation of new seals should be done on a special assessment basis with the cost to be borne by the benefiting property owners.

The new curbing will be installed and paid for by the highway department at an estimated cost of \$2,130.

BUT, THE major portion of the job, the re-surfacing, must be paid for out of city or large funds. In his report to the Council, the city manager stated that he did not feel that the city could come up with the \$13,350 needed for this work out of the 1967-68 budget and suggested that he be permitted to proceed in investigating the possibility of a small bond issue to be paid back over a ten year period. He also asked permission to forward the plans to the state highway department for approval.

While individual councilmen felt there was a need to go ahead with this project they expressed some concern for the impact with the idea of a bond issue. Their chief concern was with the fact that a bond issue would result in rather substantial additional costs in the form of interest payments.

The final decision was to approve a go ahead on the submitting the plans to the highway department for approval but delay action on proceeding with a plan for financing the city's share of the cost of the project until the next regular Council meeting two weeks hence.

The city manager made it clear that he didn't know of any other satisfactory way to finance the project other than with a bond issue unless the city can come up with the cash and that he didn't see how it could.

Strong Protest Registered

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however, was voiced by W. Allen Nelson of Warner Ave., a citizen in the audience. He pointed out that he was a retired man and that on his fixed income the only way he found it possible to do any traveling at all was by using a small trailer which he keeps in his back yard.

Nelson pointed out that he would not be able to afford to build a garage to put the trailer in and that he felt because of the size which would be required it would be unsightly anyway. It was his feeling that if the ordinance was adopted his only out would be to dispose of the trailer and quit traveling altogether.

The Council's decision at the conclusion of the discussion was to proceed with the introduction of the ordinance anyway and invite citizens' opinions at the next regular meeting before taking any final action. A check of neighboring communities in regard to this matter will also be made.

Act to Up-Date Village Zoning In Wood Creek

The Wood Creek Farms Village Council met Tuesday night, May 7, and passed a resolution approving the Village Planning Commission's recommendation that planning consultants, Villan-Leman and Associates, be retained to streamline the Village Zoning Ordinance.

Action came after a joint meeting of the Village Planning Commission and the Council on April 30 at which time the need was expressed for "up-dating" of the present Village Zoning Ordinance, was recommended by the Michigan Municipal League and Village Attorney Wendell Brown.

PUBLIC HEARINGS will be held by the Council when a draft of the proposed changes in the Zoning Ordinance are submitted by Villan-Leman. Specifically called for in the re-drafting plans is a "land use study" of property in Wood Creek Farms.

The Village lost a zoning suit in Oakland County Circuit Court last month in a case involving and use where property owner sought commercial development in a residentially zoned area.

It was the opinion of the Township Attorney that an appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court in the case would be "next to useless" under the existing Village Zoning Ordinance.

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Hi-Power Lines To Be Installed

Detroit Edison Company plans to run bulk power lines through the city and township to provide greater electrical power capacity to be needed were outlined at the City Council Monday night.

The plans are to extend a line from the Evergreen-Eight Mile transmission station down Eight Mile to Grand River. The line would then be continued on Old Grand River to the I-96 Expressway and then continue between the expressway and Freedom Drive as far as the Haggerty Road. At this point another transmission power station would be constructed.

Single tall stanchions will be erected and carry three high powered lines.

In instructing the city manager to give the city's blessing to this project, the Council requested that he urge Detroit Edison officials to consider the enclosing at least partially of the power station, Shawassaw Road just west of Orchard Lake Road. The open station detracts from the beauty of this area in the city substantially, Mayor Robert Landbert commented.

To Have Booths At State Show

The City Council has pledged its wholehearted support to the project of a combination display booth with the Township at the New Products and Inventions Show to be held May 24-26 at the Michigan State Fair Grounds.

The theme for the booth will be "Discover Farmington" and Robert Chesley of the city's economic development committee is having various displays made showing the attractiveness and potential of either operating a business or industrial firm in the Farmington area or living here.

Efforts are also being made to get several companies in the Farmington area to have new products booths in connection with the city and township booth.

The City Council has allocated \$100 to cover rental of the booth and incidental expenses. No action has been taken by the Township Board in this regard.
