**Timely Tips on GARDENING**

SPRING DISPLAY - Farmington gardens are now at the peak of the Spring blossom display. Apple trees are draped with fragrant bluish-white blossoms, and crabapple trees are laden with flowers ranging in color from pure white to deep red. Redbud branches are wreathed in soft lavender, and lilac is beginning to flower and lilacs are massed with sweet-scented blossoms. Tulips are starting a bright display, and creeping phlox, golden alyssum and a multitude of other low growing flowers are gay garden accents.  
**PERENNIALS** - provide the backbone of most flower gardens. In this category are plants that live for numerous years. Each winter the tops die back to ground level, but the roots do not die. When Spring comes new growth sprouts, and the clumps grow larger each year. Most perennials have a certain time during the summer when they bloom. This bloom period lasts several weeks, but generally does not extend all summer. Different perennials bloom at different times, and to have a continuous display varieties must be chosen that bloom early in the season, mid-season, and late summer. The season begins with creeping phlox, perennials, blue candytuft, virginia bluebells and dwarf iris. Next comes bleeding heart, forget-me-nots, wood phlox, columbine, and painted daisies.  
June is the month during which the greatest number of perennials bloom. The garden is a blaze of color with peonies, iris, delphinium, oriental poppies, pansies, pink, lemon lilies, and chrysanthemums. Creeping veronica, lupines, baptisia, campan-
