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Special Ed. to Be Expanded

Another expansion to the constantly growing special education department of the Farmington public school system will be made with the start of the 1963-64 school year.

Official Board of Education action was taken Monday night approving the addition of four more programs in special education, to be made available by the administration and approved by the County Board of Education.

Two new types of classes for mentally handicapped students at the elementary grade levels will be offered as well as a third for morally slow students. The new classes will be taught in the high school and give the brackets. Attempts will be made to place the older handicapped children in jobs in the area where they work while attending school part time.

The fourth program will be one of having a full-time teacher on the Farmington system's staff to give guidance to home-bound youngsters to be confined to their homes for extended periods of time due to serious injuries or illnesses.

The entire special education program is underwritten by the county.

Adopted Resolution Acceptance of Offer to Amend Grant Agreement from \$125,000.00 to \$120,000.00.

Motion by Brotherton supported by Peterson to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, the United States of America, acting by and through the Regional Director of Community Facilities, has transmuted to the City of Farmington, Michigan, herein called the "Applicant", for acceptance an offer to amend Grant Agreement dated May 4, 1963, in connection with the project identified as Project No. AFPA-Michigan; and

WHEREAS, said Offer to Amend Grant Agreement has been fully considered in accordance with all pertinent rules of procedure and legal requirements, and made a part of the Applicant's public records; and

WHEREAS, it is desired to advise the public interest that said Offer to Amend Grant Agreement will be accepted.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is resolved by the City of Farmington City Council that the Offer to Amend Grant Agreement is accepted and confirmed, and is hereby accepted without reservation or qualification, and the Applicant agrees to comply with the provisions thereof.
