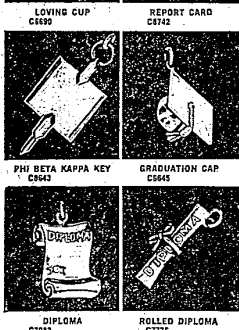


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Special Ed. to Be Expanded

Another expansion to the constantly growing special education department of the Farmington public school system will be made with the start of the 1964 school year.

Official Board of Education action was taken Monday night approving the addition of four more programs to special education as recommended by the administration and approved by the County Board of Education.

Two new types of classes for mentally handicapped youngsters at the elementary grade levels will be offered as well as a third for mentally slow students now in the high school grade brackets. Attempts will be made to place the older handicapped children in jobs in the area where they work while attending school part time.

The fourth program will be one of having a full-time teacher at the Farmington system staff to give instructions to home-bound youngsters to be confined to their homes for extended periods of time due to serious injuries or illnesses.

The state special education program is underwritten by the county.

plays during the summer.

The plays to be staged will be open to the public and performed in the same manner as adult theatre, it was pointed out.

The second new class proposed is one in basketball schooling with separate sessions for boys in the younger age group and those in the older grade classification.

A SURVEY conducted earlier has indicated substantial interest in this type of program, according to John Cotton, physical education director for the school system.

Boys entering grades 5 thru 7 next fall will be invited to enroll in the one hour session from 9 a.m. until 10 a.m., and those in grades 8 thru 11 in the two hour session from 10 a.m. until 12 noon.

The training program will stress fundamental skills and general conditioning and will be enriched through audio-visual aids and controlled scrimmage sessions, according to Cotton.

Courses conducted last year which are again planned for this year are:

- Elementary grades 4 thru 6 - reading, arithmetic, instrument art music, language arts and French.
- Secondary grades 7 thru 12 - 7th grade math, 8th grade math, general math 1 and 2, algebra 1 and 2, plane geometry, English 10th and 11th grade social studies, U.S. history, world history, typing, general science, reading, instrumental music, typing and driver training.

supported Hall's contention Road Commission approval is needed by the Township either to erect a road sign.

THE ONLY SOLUTION, the Board felt, is to require subdivision developers to build concrete roads in place of blacktop streets which are more susceptible to break-ups and deterioration. It was pointed out, however, that such a requirement would raise a higher cost to home owners buying in the Township and unless such a restriction was adopted simultaneously with neighboring townships, the competitive position for future development in Farmington Township would suffer.

The Board explained further that the requirements have been raised each year on the blighted roads built by subdivision developers in an effort to prevent serious repair problems later. Black-top roads, it was said, by the Board, just don't hold up from year to year in spite of increased measures to raise their specifications.

It was pointed out by the Board, abutting property owners can act to improve their roads by establishing special assessments paying projects like the one presently planned in Farmington's Knapville Division. Franklin Smith has been approved by the Board for the establishment of a Drainage District preparatory to initiating a concrete paving project. The action was also taken at the Monday night Board meeting.

School Teacher Here 36 Years Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Lucille May Halsted Olsen of 28801 North Farmington Road in Farmington died suddenly May 10 of a heart attack at St. Mary's Hospital in Livonia at the age of 57.

Mrs. Olsen taught in the Farmington School System where she had graduated in 1924. A teacher for 36 years, she also taught in Keego Harbor, Clarencetown, and the Auburn Heights schools. She was a graduate of both Michigan State Normal College and Wayne State University.

SHE WAS BORN March 21, 1906, in Farmington, Township, the daughter of James B. and Frances Watts Halsted. Her mother, Mrs. Frances Halsted, survives her. She was married May 8, 1948, to Clarence Olsen who preceded her in death on December 27, 1956.

Also surviving are two brothers, Gage Halsted of Farmington and Lloyd Halsted of Honolulu, Hawaii.

Services were conducted May 13 from the Spencer J. Heeney Funeral Home with the Rev. Richard Markham of the First Methodist Church of Farmington officiating. Interment was at Oakwood Cemetery in Farmington.

Zoning Plan Passed

The Farmington Township Board passed a resolution at their Monday night, May 13, meeting amending the Zoning Ordinance to include a provision for "planned unit development."

Under the new amendment, developers building in the Township will be required to make provisions in their subdivision plans for recreational areas or parks. The Board expressed the feeling such a provision in the Township Zoning Ordinance would prove a benefit to residents of any future subdivision.

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Approve \$8,000 for School Equipment

The Farmington Board of Education approved expenditures for Monday night of slightly over \$8,000 for additional equipment proposed for purchase by the administration for the East Junior High and Highmeadow and Flinders elementary schools.

The bulk of this, \$5,317, was for the new junior high.
