

Forensic Students At Drama Festival

Four North Farmington forensic students recently performed in the Tod Mossel play "Impromptu," coached by the North Farmington director of forensic studies, Miss Judy A. Rohm.

Marla Welton as Winifred, Steve Varian as Ernest, Don Bramlage as Tony, and Marilyn Myers as Lora, performed in the play last Saturday at the Waterford Kettering High School Drama Festival, and for the Farmington Kiwanis Club "at a powerful message."

In "Impromptu" the author is trying to point out the difference between the illusion and the reality of life, and this task could only be achieved through this modern style of acting, set design, lighting, make-up, and costumes. The play is performed with symbolic settings and costumes that create obvious focus on characterization.

Miss Rohm is hoping that she can schedule a public performance of the play yet this semester at North Farmington High School. She said all individuals in the east have excellent potential in acting.

MISS ROHM, said that "Impromptu" is one of the most modern plays ever presented on a high school stage—it defies all of the conventions of realistic theatre in that the actors are completely involved in the play, and they are walking to the edge of the stage and speaking directly to the audience. This is a comparatively new technique in theatre, and Miss Rohm said she feels that for the purposes of the play, it is a very effective device.

Schools participating in the Waterford Festival were Waterford High School, Pontiac Central, Royal Oak, Dearborn, and North Farmington. This is North Farmington's first year in this annual event, in which the students are not judged competitively, but are evaluated by critics.

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Farmington to Offer Summer Art Classes

A series of summer art classes for students of the Farmington Area will again this year be sponsored by the Detroit Art Institute in cooperation with the Farmington Public Schools. These classes will begin July 9 at Farmington High School, 3200 Shawwassee, Farmington.

Students in Grades 1 through 12 in the Farmington area are eligible to participate in the program. Interest in art, but not necessarily talent is advisable for participation.

THE PROGRAM, taught by instructors hired by the Foundation of the Detroit Institute of Art, will follow an entirely new theme each year in order that students that have previously taken the course will find new which to work. The materials, each year, are assembled from the archives of the Institute and may constitute pictures, slides, original art and manuscripts from all over the world. These are used to introduce and motivate the lessons which are covered in various associated media such as paint, clay and paper. The materials fee for the classes is used to defray the cost of the materials and the instructors. Schedule of classes and enrollment blanks will be posted out this week in the elementary grades of the Farmington Public Schools. They will also be available from the art teachers in the Farmington Secondary schools and to others by calling the Board of Education, GR. 4-3122.

Farmington Elementary Art Consultant Robert Benjamin will be glad to answer any questions that parents might have about the classes. The classes, Mr. Benjamin said, are to be a most worthwhile supplement to the art instruction that is a part of the school curriculum.
