**Parade to Open North
Farmington Little League**

Nine hundred boys, countless friends and parents, and the officials of North Farmington Baseball for Boys are placing their trust in the weatherman, anticipating the largest opening day in their history on this Saturday, May 25.

Fifty-two teams are scheduled to see action at twelve baseball diamonds located on various school playfields in the north-end of the township.

Preceded by the new marching band of North Farmington High School and led by a color guard representing each of the major league teams, the boys will parade from the high school on Thirteen Mile to the baseball fields at Bond School for the raising ceremonies at 12 noon.

Frank Reynolds, commissioner of baseball for the North Farmington organization, has issued invitations to many of the board of education and township officials, along with the team sponsors, to participate in the day's activities. All indications point to a record turnout for the opening games.

Township Supervisor Curt Hall, Township Police Chief Irving Yakes, Judge Robert Nelson and Farmington School District Athletic Director John K. Cotton will form the opening batteries at Bond School. Chief Yakes will have the opportunity to see the "Orioles" (sponsored by the Township Police Department) in action in the first game.

Following introduction of the starting line ups at Bond School brief ceremonies will be held at Ward Eagle School marking the initial play of the Little League Majors at this playing field.

FRANK REYNOLDS reports that a maintenance crew consisting of more than a dozen fathers of the players has been working steadily for several weeks to have the fields in the best possible condition.
